Dr. Talmage Draws Lessons from the Life of Nimrod.

How to be Skillful in Spiritual Hunting—Some of the Targets.

Washington, D. C., June 29.—All people who are trying to do good will find this discourse of Dr. Talmage inspiring as well as unique. His text was Genesis, x., 9—"He was a mighty hunter before the Lord."

In our day, hunting is a sport; but in the lands and the times infested with wild beasts, it was a matter of life or death with the people. It was very different from going out on a sunny afternoon with a patent breech-loader, to shoot reed-birds on the flats, when Pollux and Achilles and Diomedes went out to clear the land of lions and tigers and bears. My text sets forth Nimrod as a hero when it presents him with broad shoulders and shaggy apparel and sun-browned face, and arm bunched with muscle—"a mighty hunter before the Lord." I think he used the bow and the arrows with great success practicing archery.

I have thought if it is such a grand thing and such a brave thing, about wild beasts out of a country, if it is not a better and braver thing to hunt down and destroy those evil societies that are stalking the land with fierce eye and bloody paw, and sharp bow and quick spring. I have wondered if such a thing as this Gospel archery, by which those who have been flying from the truth may be captured for God and heaven. The Lord Jesus used his sermon as the art of angling for an illustration when he said: "I will make you fishers of men." And so I think I have authority for using hunting as an illustration of Gospel truth; and I pray God that there may be many a man today who will study Gospel archery, of whom it may after a while, be said: "He was a mighty hunter before the Lord."

In the first place, if you want to be effectual in doing good, you must be very sure of your weapon. There was something about the bow and arrow, the archery of olden times. Perhaps you do not know what they could do with the bow and arrow. Why, the chief battles fought by the English Plantagenets were with the long-bow. They would take the arrow of polished steel, and then it would fly from the bow-string of plaited silk. The broad fletchings of Agincourt, and Solway Moss, and Tewkesbury, and the loud thrum of the archer's bow-string. Now, my Christian friends, we have a mighty weapon than that. It is the arrow of the Gospel. It is a straight arrow; it is a straight arrow; it is feathered from the wings of the dove of God's spirit. It is a straight arrow, made out of the wood of the cross. As far as I can estimate or calculate, it has brought down four hundred million souls. Every man knows how to bring the notch of that arrow on to the bow-string, and its whirr was heard through the court room, until the knees of Felix knocked together. It was that arrow that struck Luther's sinners! Oh, my sinners! If it strike a man in the head, it kills his scepticism; if it strike a man in the chest, it cures his doubt; if it strike a man in the heart, he throws up his hands, as did the Emperor Julian of old when he was killed in the battle of Strasbourg. "Oh, Galilean, Thou hast conquered!"

In the army of the Earl of Pembroke there are old counselors who show that the arrow of the English used to go through the breastplate, through the body of the warrior, and the religion of Huxley and the Spencer were a pedestal on which human philosophy sits shivering in the night. What are men about that they will not accept their own deliverance? There is no other way proposed by me than that can do anything like this Gospel. The religion of Ralph Waldo Emerson was the philosophy of idols; the religion of Thomas Huxley was the philosophy of the desert covering up the soul with dry sand; the religion of Renan was the romance of believing nothing; the religion of the Huxley and the Spencer were a pedestal on which human philosophy sits shivering in the night. What are men about that they will not accept their own deliverance? There is no other way proposed by me than that can do anything like this Gospel.

He had loaded up a piece of gun with gunpowder for some purpose as yet unexplained, and then introduced a lighted match to one end. The explosion which followed was terrific. Young Vickers was picked up half insensible, with his face and hands badly burned, and both eyes completely closed. The doctors think one eye can be saved, but the sight of the other is entirely gone.

Michael McGarvin, the Chatham auctioneer, was arrested on Saturday on a warrant charging him with the theft of \$50 from John A. Wright. In April last McGarvin, who claimed to have represented the Agricultural Loan and Savings Company, London, sold to Wright the property known as the Smyth farm, on con. 6 of Harwich. Wright paid \$50 as a deposit, and was to have been the possessor of the farm in the fall. A short time afterwards word was received that the Loan Company would not accept the agreement made between Wright and McGarvin. In the meantime McGarvin had spent the \$50 and was unable to refund it. When Wright asked him to do so, McGarvin's defence was that he was empowered by the loan company to sell the farm for a certain price, and he was to receive a commission of \$100. The company entered into with Wright in good faith, and when the \$50 was paid he thought he had a right to keep it as part of his commission. Mr. McGarvin is out on bail. He says that he will repay the money.

At eventide the camp is adorned with the treasures of the forest—beak, and fin, and antler. If you hunt for immortal souls, not only bring them down under the arrow of the Gospel, but bring them into the Church of God, the encampment we have pitched this side of the skies. Fetch them in; do not let them be out in the open field. They need our prayers and sympathies and help. That is the meaning of the Church of God—help. O ye hunters for the Lord, not only bring down the game, but bring it in.

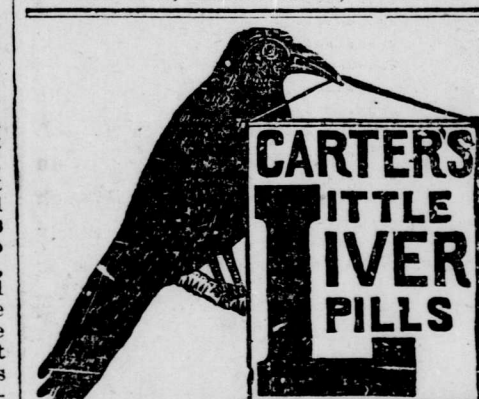
Speculation Regarding the Democratic Convention.

Indications that the Silver Men Will Control It.

Chicago, June 30.—One week from today the Democratic national convention will meet in this city, and from present indications the silver men will control it, dictate its platform and nominate its Presidential ticket. The gold standard men failing to stem the bi-metallic tide have either to acquiesce in the inevitable or withdraw from the convention, as did the silver Republicans at St. Louis. The accepted estimates of the respective strength of the gold and silver wings of the Democratic party total for silver 562, and for gold 331. The gold wing is made up of two from the district of Columbia are non-committal.

All of the Democratic Presidential candidates positively in advance at the present time are free silver men, but the leaders of the sound money movement may unite on Whitney or some other Eastern man when they reach Chicago. The leading free silver candidates whose names are certain to go before the convention are Horace Boies, of Iowa, a free silver and low tariff Democrat, who left the Republican party a few years ago because that party stood for a protective tariff; Richard P. Bland, of Missouri, known as "Silver Dollar Bland," and a free silver man; and Claude Matthews, of Indiana, a plain farmer and a popular Hoosier, with some following in the States that border on the south side of the Ohio River; W. J. Bryan, of Nebraska, called by admiring constituents the "Boy Orator of the Platte"; he has a loud and enduring voice, and for four years has been advocating the free and unlimited coinage of silver at 16 to the dollar. The other candidates are ex-Governor James E. Campbell, of Ohio, and Senator Teller, of Colorado, who bolted from the Republican convention, and whose friends want him to stand as the fusion candidate of the Democrats. 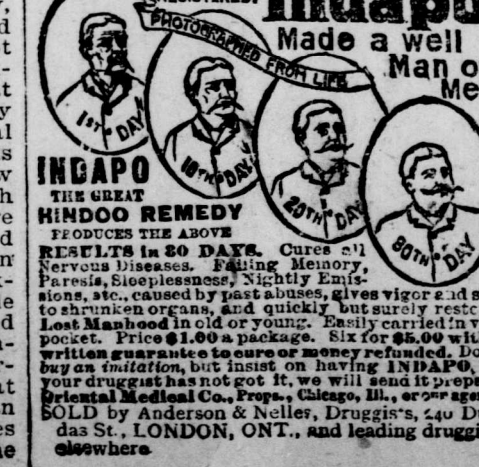

IN LABOR CIRCLES.

Serious Trouble in Cleveland—One Man Fatally Injured.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 30.—The strike at the Brown Hoisting Company's works, involving 800 men, has been in progress five weeks, and no settlement seems in sight. The strikers are growing bolder, and the location of the establishment is such that the police are unable to do effective work. Every day the few men who have returned to work have to be escorted by officers, or they are set upon and beaten. M. Schautz, one of the men, was beaten so badly last night that he will die.

At 4:30 this afternoon a riot broke out at the works, and all the police in the city were ordered to the scene.

Victory for the Spaniards—At Least They Say So.

Havana, June 30.—A force of 400 insurgents under Hios it is announced has been besieging Yara for three days. They have now been repulsed with considerable loss. The insurgents under Felix Triay, numbering about 80 men, have made an attempt to surprise the guerrilla force defending Cayo Redondo, Province of Pinar Del Rio. The guerrillas under Lieut. Aller made a gallant defense and killed Triay and fourteen of his followers.
