The Celebrating of Sedan Day in Germany

Recalls Unpleasant Memories in France - Effects of the Franco-Russian Alliance - Locust Pest in Korea - Cretons Shoot at Turks.

London, Sept. 3.-The semi-annual meeting of the Bank of British North America took place yesterday. In his address Chairman Hoares gave an insight of the general feeling in commercial circles, which is that Canada is on the eve of a great business revival.

Going into specific statements, after a generalization of conditions tending towards renewed prosperity in the Dominion, Mr. Hoares cited that the bank's profits for the half-year were \$170,155, against \$129,705 for the preceding like period. The interim dividend was 2 1/2 per cent, as compared with 2 per cent. He was of the opinion that the outlook was most hopeful, and this favorable condition applied especially to the Northwest and the Kootenay country.

VICTIMS OF THE AVALANCHE. Bern, Sept. 3.-The remains of three of the victims of the Mont Pleureur avalanche disaster, including Bernard, the young Englishman, have been recovered in a terribly mutilated condition.

IMPERIAL JUNKETING. London, Sept. 3.-A newspaper of Bern announces that the czar and carina will come to Darmstadt about the middle of September, and will remain there ten days. It is possible that a meeting between the czar and Emperor William will take place, although, according to his present program, Emperor William will be in Hungary at this time.

THE KLONDIKE BOOM. London, Sept. 3.-The Klondike boom is abating in London, yet a new company, the Klondike Gold Reefs Exploration Company is advertised today. The capital is placed at \$500,000. The government offices, the Canadian Pacific Railway agents, and the steamship company representatives report that there are many inquiries about the new northern mining fields, and they expect that the spring rush to the Klondike will be very active.

AN UNWELCOME VISITOR. Madrid, Sept. 3.-All the newspapers of the city publish strong protests against the mission of Gen. Stewart L. Woodford, the new United States minister to Spain, thus causing widespread indignation.

Berlin, Sept. 3.-It is asserted upon reliable authority that the German Government will demand from France the signing of the Franco-Russian alliance, in which dispatch M. Melne expressed the hope of a reunion of Alsace-Lorraine with the French Republic. Germany, it is announced, will demand satisfaction for the ex-embassy in Paris, on the evening of President Faure's return from his visit to Russia.

Berlin, Sept. 3.-The anniversary of the battle of Sedan was celebrated here with much less enthusiasm than usual, the evident desire being to dis-credit the anniversary of all elements hostile to France. Flags were flying from the public buildings, and the school children were given a holiday.

Still smarting under the completion of the battle of Sedan, the German papers expressed the opportunity to convey to France a hint that she must abandon any idea of the restoration of Alsace-Lorraine. The democratic organs urge the abolition of what they term a useless celebration. The evening paper cannot severely upon Premier Melne's want of tact in sending a reply to the message of congratulation to the Alsace-Lorraine Society upon the signing of the alliance, thus encouraging the members in an act which, from the German view point, involved high treason. It is believed, however, that the incident will be amicably adjusted by its being declared a misunderstanding.

Gustav Daubenspeck, the German who was arrested at Brussels yesterday on suspicion of being concerned in a plot to assassinate Emperor William, has been released. He is believed to be of proof of the existence of such a conspiracy.

The News From India's Frontier Is Improving.

The Ameer's Last Reply to the Government Considered Ample-Panitive Expeditions.

Simla, Sept. 3.-The rumor that the Indian Government is about to send a fresh letter to the Ameer of Afghanistan regarding the alleged complicity of Afghans in the frontier uprisings proves to be without foundation. The ameer's first reply to the government has been received that the flying column, under command of Col. Richardson, has reached Sadding, thus rendering the Parichind headquarters in the Kurran valley safe, as Sadda commands the only route from the Orakzai country to the north.

The news from the Kohat side is satisfactory also, the Orakzais having withdrawn from British territory, though a large force of them is still facing Samana.

The authorities have sanctioned the advance of Col. Elies, at Shabkadr, to advance as a punitive force direct into the Mohmand country and check the second raid of Haddadullah with 4,000 tribesmen. This decision has given great satisfaction, and the knowledge that British forces have at last taken the offensive will probably have a deterrent effect on the tribes all along the frontier.

The second regiment of Gourkhas, with Brigadier-General Yeatman-Biggs at their head, are returning to Wimpole. There the camp, which was open and scattered, has been transformed into a defensive condition, surrounded by shelter trenches and breastworks of earth bags. The camp has also been well supplied with stores and ammunition.

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Canadians Nearly Starved

Sub-Collector Gibson and Northwest Mounted Policemen With Him Were Four Days Without Food.

Victoria, B. C. Sept. 3.-Had it not been for the fortunate chance that took one Tacoma woman to the Klondike gold fields the Dominion Government would in all probability be mourning today the loss of twenty faithful servants. John Gibson, the British sub-collector of customs at Tash Lake, and the Northwest Mounted Police who accompanied him, have been as close to starving as was possible for men to be and live.

They went in by way of Skaguay a month or more ago, and being in haste to reach their post of duty, started "light" over the newly reopened trail, trusting for their supplies to the pack train that was to follow them three days later. Unfortunately for them, the trail was delayed by rains a day after they had completed the most difficult part of the journey.

When George Knight fell in with the party on Aug. 15 at a point six miles beyond the last settlement, they had been four days without food, and were in a most pitiable condition. Their hands and bodies were raw and bleeding from contact with the deep and jagged rocks, their clothing was in tatters, their health had been jeopardized by the terrible conditions.

The coming of Mr. Knight gave them fresh courage, and a little later their God Samaritan arrived in the form of a pack train. The pack train, which was delayed by rains a day after they had completed the most difficult part of the journey, arrived in the form of a pack train.

Despite her martial garb, the unfortunate police and the customs official quickly discovered that she had a heart for her, she had no sooner discovered their position than she was at work cooking, and while the two parties passed on together, the government men had the assurance that they should not go hungry again.

The letters which Col. Milne received today from Deputy Collectors Gibson and McInnes give the good news that the party reached Tash Lake without further misadventure, and are now resting at the Tash Lake Hotel, performing the duties that took them into the northern wilderness.

Rev. Frank Vrooman's Resolve - Run Out of Two Churches He Will Look for Filthy Lucre in Klondike.

Toronto, Sept. 3.-Aeronaut Leo Stevens has successfully tested his new generator for manufacturing gas for his balloon, and says he will leave for the Klondike in the latter part of this month. Stevens also declares he will go to Andre's rescue, provided his later experiments are successful.

Plenty of Gold, But the Best Claims Are Gone.

Winnipeg, Man, Sept. 3.-Your correspondent saw a letter today from Murdoch MacDonald, formerly of Winnipeg, dated Dawson City, July 2. He says the trip over the Chilkoot Pass and into the country is terrible, and it would be suicide for anyone except the strongest to go in. There is plenty of gold in the country, and any amount of work about it, but the best claims have been taken up, and he and others are going prospecting. If they fail in their return to Dawson City and work, as wages run from \$10 to \$15 per day.

FROM THE PULPIT TO THE DIGGINGS.

Chicago, Sept. 3.-I have been frozen out of the Presbyterian Church and starved out of the People's Church, all in one year, and I am through with preaching, said Rev. Frank E. Vrooman, co-pastor of the People's Church. "I am going to the Klondike," Mr. Vrooman, who has been associated with Dr. H. W. Thomas in the pulpit of the fashionable People's Church for some time, has turned his back on the pulpit for good, and has projected and partly organized on a large scale a labor union, known as the Klondike miners' union.

This scheme originated with him, he said, "but is backed by my brother in St. Louis. Our company has not been incorporated nor named yet, but it will be on a large scale and will be capitalized at \$100,000."

THE LUCKY 200.

San Francisco, Sept. 3.-The Bulletin has received a letter from Charles Haines, dated Dawson City, July 26. Mr. Haines is a well-known newspaper writer, and his letter is the first written by a trained newspaper man to come out of the Klondike gold regions.

He says: "There is every prospect of an immense output of gold from this district next spring. The total output this season is, as near as I can judge, about \$7,000,000."

"This Alaska northwest is an odd prize-drawing proposition that I can liken to nothing but the lottery of a better comparison than a lottery. A number of spots are selected on the creeks and rivers, and for one year the miners run, and the season's output barely pays expenses. Not two miles away from the Klondike, one works a man who has taken from an uninviting bit of earth a sackful of gold."

"The lucky 200 must strike the pocket because of his ability as a miner; chance favored him, and that was all. In spirit the miner guesses that the Klondike is a lottery, and in nineteen cases out of twenty he misses it, and has to wait another year for his next try. Dawson is a mass of tents, about 600 in number. When the long nights come and the clouds come down to 45 degrees below zero there will be intense suffering here, and I shudder to think of the prospect."

"Provisions are going to be very scarce, and there is little reason to doubt that the entire town will have to go on short rations during the winter."

Revived in France by the Sedan Celebration in Germany.

Paris, Sept. 3.-The attitude of the French press and public towards Germany is distinctly more resolute than it was before the Franco-Russian alliance was announced. Various rumors concerning the government's intentions are in circulation-among them, one to the effect that upon the resumption of the Chamber of Deputies, M.
