MET HIS DEATH IN ICY CURRENT

Dr. F. Turnbull, a Physician of Auburn, Drowned.

ATTEMPTED A PERILOUS TRIP

Canoe Upset and, Though Alive When Taken Out, Victim Succumbed to Exposure.

Goderich, Ont., March 13.—An attempt to run the River Maitland from Auburn to Goderich in a canoe resulted today in the death of Frank Turnbull, M. D., a clever young physician, who had been practicing at Auburn, and was a brother of Dr. J. L. Turnbull, of this town. He had sold his practice and was about to go abroad to prosecute further studies in his profession, and before leaving was anxious to perform a feat which has frequently been undertaken by some of the young men of this town, the navigation of the Maitland during the spring flood.

The river broke up only a few days ago, and the icy current was flowing with great rapidity. This morning at 10:30 he started from Auburn to make the hazardous trip of forty miles down the winding river to Goderich. How or where the accident occurred is not known, but an eye-witness of the tragedy, it was seen from the G. T. R. station at 2:30 in the afternoon.

The river from this point takes a broad sweep around the town, and a telephone message was sent to the harbor to intercept the unfortunate man. This was done, and he was taken to the hospital, where efforts were made by all the doctors of the town, including his brother, to restore life to the chilled body. The attempt was unsuccessful, and after two hours the body was reluctantly given up their task. The interment will be at Milverton.

Dr. Turnbull was a young man of about 25 years of age, and was a brother of Dr. J. L. Turnbull, of this town.
