FROM OCEAN TO OCEAN AN EFFECTIVE PRODUCTION

Sir A. C. Mackenzie Will Conduct Kelcey and Shannon Are, as Usual,

Sir Alexander Campbell Mackenzie, England's greatest hving composer, who is principal of the London Royal Academy of Music, whence Arthur Sullivan sprang, will conduct the singers of this city next April. Mr. Charles A. E. Harriss is here making all preliminary arrangements that London may be included in the cycle of musical festivals, which commence at Halifax, and terminate at Victoria. Festival choruses have been formed in all of the principal towns, and aggregate upwards of tour thousand voices. The soloists come from England; the orchestra numbers 50 performers, Sir Alexander Mackenzie taking the conducorship in each town, these choruses being trained during the winter months by a local associate conductor. It is a stupendous work on behalf of musical progress all over the country, of such far-reaching a purport, that induced Sir A. C. Mackenzie to leave London and his busy life for a month and associate himself with Mr. Harriss in this effort.

These festivals will include newlyorganized choruses in nearly all the provinces. The works of British composers will be a feature of the festivals, choral and orchestral compositions given in their entirety by such eminent composers as Villiers, Stanford, Hubert Parry, Arthur Sullivan, Frederick Cowen, Edward Elgar, Alexander Mackenzie and many others. The choral works to be given in Canada will include Mackenzie "Story of Sayid," Mackenzie's "Dream of Jubal," Mackenzie's "The Cotter's Saturday Night," Parry's "Ode to Music," Parry's "Blest Pair of Sirens," Parry's "Ode on St. Cecilia's Day," Cowan's "Coronation Day," Cowan's "Ode to the Passions," Stanford's "Re-venge," Stanford's "Battle of the Baltic," Coleridge Taylor's "Hiawatha," Elgar's "Banner of St. George," El-gar's "Coronation Ode," "Scandinavian Symphony," Stanford's "Irish Rhapsody," German's "Gipsy Suite," Cann's overture, "The Land of the Mountain and the Flood," Sullivan's overture, "Di Ballo," Mackenzie's overture, to the opera, "The Cricket on the Hearth," Mackenzie's suite, "London Day by Day," Mackenzie's "Scotch Rhapsody" (No. 1), and Burns' "Scotch Rhapsody" (No. 2), Mackenzie's "La Belle Dames Sans Merci," Mackenzie's "Britannia" overture, and Mackenzie's "Coronation March." It will be seen that the music covers a wide and varied range.

Cycle of Musical Festivals To Be | Sherlock Holmes Pleased Every Given in Canada. Member of Audience.

Surrounded by Admirable Support.

It is doubtful if there was a single member of the audience at the Grand Opera House last night who failed to thoroughly enjoy the fine production of William Cillette's melodrama, "Sherlock Holmes," as presented by Mr. Herbert Kelcey and Miss Effie Shannon, assisted by a clever and evenly balanced company. It is alto-gether regrettable that these two favorite players should have come to London and been confronted by a house which was not nearly commensurate with the merits of the attraction. The large sale for the Scotch concert of tonight is alleged as a reason for the inadequate patronage extended to last night's attraction, but this can hardly be taken as a sufficient excuse for the action of Londoners in slighting two artists whose productions are always clean, pleasing and presented with a careful attento details which make them doubly delightful to the critical playgoer.

In "Sherlock Holmes," Mr. Gillette has given to the stage an absorbing play and an extraordinary character. The plot is partly taken from Conan Doyle's "A Scandal in Bohemia," partly from an unpublished story by the same author, and is partly supplied by the dramatist. Other of Doyle's stories have been called upon to furnish portions of the dialogue. The gentral figure of the play retains the superhuman powers and unique personality with which he was invested by his creator, Dr. Doyle, but Mr. Gillette has, for stage purposes, endowed him with a heart, thus adding the popular element of a love story. While the drama has its weak spots, it forms on the whole a logical sequence of events, and its impossibilities are only those arising out of the fact that its hero is an impossible man.

From the roles of the two principals

to the most minor part, the cast was a meritorious one. Mr. Kelcey's work as Sherlock Holmes was a surprise to those who had hitherto seen more conventional impersonations. He
