FRANCE DROVE OUT \$200,000,000

Exiled Religious Orders Were Immensely Rich.

ESTATE SALES BROUGHT TITLE

Much Money Was Raised on Mortgages, and Orders Took Much Personal Property.

Paris, Nov. 2.—It is estimated that the sale of the property of the religious orders in France, which, at the time the laws against religious associations were adopted, was estimated at about \$200,000,000, has brought very little to the state. All such properties, consisting of chapels, monasteries, convents, school buildings and private residences, were acquired either by the municipalities or by private interests. It is stated on good authority that the total amount received by the state from the proceeds of the sales did not reach the round figure of \$2,000,000.

Several reasons are given to explain the matter. The fact that the majority of the buildings which belonged to the religious orders, and which originally cost a large amount of money, could not very well be adapted to other uses without meeting with large expenses, caused an enormous depreciation on their actual value when they were sold. A convent at Nancy, which was assessed in the tax books at \$80,000, when sold at auction brought only \$5,500. Twelve religious houses in a single French city, formerly occupied by female religious orders, which were assessed in the books of the municipality as being worth \$400,000, were recently sold, and the whole of the property brought only \$28,000.

Then, many of the religious orders, before they were compelled to leave France, mortgaged their properties for large amounts of money. The mortgages had to be paid out of the proceeds from the sales. In many instances private parties were represented as the real owners of some of the properties, monasteries, schools, etc., and in these cases the property could not be sold without an order from the court. The enormous expenses encountered by the French Government for legal proceedings, for the salaries of the assessors and real estate agents, and for the percentages due to the temporary administrators and liquidators have also absorbed an enormous part of the proceeds from the sales of the properties belonging to the religious orders.

Some of the properties still remain unsold for lack of purchasers, and matters have been so complicated that the French bishops to announce that anyone acquiring the property of the religious orders without a special permission from the Holy See would incur the penalty of excommunication. Although 24 French bishops have issued pastoral letters on the subject, and it is feared that because of this it will be more difficult in the future to find purchasers for the properties. In Government circles it is felt that this fear of excommunication will not only absolutely prevent the Catholics from purchasing the properties, but will also deter many non-Catholics from investing in such speculations for fear that the purchase may remain for a long time in their hands.

In fact, there is already a discussion going on about the advisability of allowing the sale of the properties of the bishops to the state. The legal advice given by the bishops to the state is that the action of the bishops in the matter has seriously injured the market value of the properties, and that the state would be obliged to pay a large sum of money to the bishops for the loss of their properties.

It is estimated that the total value of the properties of the religious orders which have left France for other countries have brought with them a great deal of personal property, which is estimated to be worth about \$200,000,000.

From statistics gathered from the French banking houses it appears that the personal property of the religious orders is still invested in French securities, as the coupons for the periodical payments of interest have been regularly presented, as if they were still in possession of their establishments. The French government, however, has refused to pay the interest on these securities, and the religious orders have been obliged to leave France, and practically in many cases are now better off than before their expulsion from France.

Where They Have Gone.

The French Benedictines, for instance, have opened a magnificent establishment in the Isle of France, to which place they brought from France personal property valued at more than five million dollars. The reformed nuns, the Trappists, who possessed large tracts of land in many parts of France, have been enabled to dispose of some of this property to advantage before they were compelled to go into exile.

The Carthusians, who have taken their monastic life to Spain, are said to have taken along with them money and securities amounting to more than eight million dollars, and are now enjoying the advantage of saving 20 per cent on the interest which they used to receive on religious and charitable purposes in their own country.

The Minor Franciscans are known to have saved the entire year's income, amounting to about \$1,000,000, and left the state. The Capuchins did not save very much, but it is affirmed that they have been able to save nearly half a million dollars.

The only unfortunate ones were the French Dominicans, who have been forced to leave France, and have been compelled to go into exile.

The Jesuits are perhaps the only members of the French religious orders who have not yet left France, and they now reside two or three together in private houses or apartments. That they have been able to send their personal

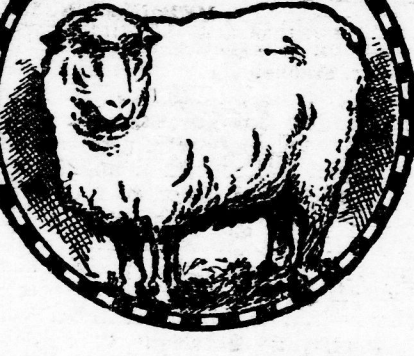

that each of the French Jesuits now receives from the head house in Rome an annual pension amounting to \$400, with which they are enabled to continue in their churches without materially violating the laws against the association.

Where Italy Benefits.

Of the other French religious orders, the Assumptionists, who were perhaps the richest, have now a capital of \$200,000, which is administered from their central house in Rome, where twenty bookkeepers, under the direction of their procurator, Father Bandini, attend to the administration and distribution of the income from their large funds. The Benedictines, who have also a superior in Rome, are said to enjoy an annual income from their investments of nearly \$200,000. The Fathers of Saint Vincent de Paul are known to have brought from France nearly \$50,000 to their general house in Rome.

The Lazarists, the Marists and the White Fathers, who possess large establishments in several missionary centers, are also considered enormously wealthy, notwithstanding the fact that they have sold, the Lazarists especially possessing several banking establishments in the country.

THE OLDEST OLD MAID.

Kokomo, Ind., Nov. 3.—Miss Eliza Williams, an old unmarried woman in the United States was 101 years old today. She is confined to her bed with a crushed hip, the result of a fall a few days ago. MORE TROUBLE ON THE GRAND BANKS

U. S. Fishermen Say They Will Send to Washington for a Warship.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 2.—Another serious complication arose yesterday in the herring fishery situation at Bay of Islands, when the steamer Active, carrying eight small loads of local fishermen, sailed with the intention of proceeding outside the three-mile limit, and there transferring the fishermen to American fishing vessels, on which they would ship as members of the crews.

The American cutter Clona chased the Active, and threatened her with seizure if she went beyond the three-mile limit without clearance papers. The Active thereupon returned.

The Active authorities refuse to grant clearance papers to the steamer to go on a bona fide voyage.

The British cruiser Latona is patrolling the bay to prevent collisions between the rival fishermen.

TO REMEDY CAR SHORTAGE

Delegation Consult With G. T. R. and Come Away Satisfied.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 2.—At a recent meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway Association strong dissent was taken to the shortage of cars that exists at the Georgian Bay ports, and a delegation was appointed to wait on Mr. Louie, traffic manager of the Grand Trunk, to see if some remedy could not be attained. Since then the matter has been referred to the railway commission.

The delegation, however, which was headed by Mr. Cuttle, president of the association, waited on Mr. Louie today and talked the matter over. The delegation expressed itself as satisfied with the interview.

SPORT AND PORTER IN DUEL

Former Uses Gun, But Negro Closes In and Disarms Him.

POLICEMAN SHOT; WOULDN'T QUIT

Beaten and Left for Dead by Gang is Patched Up and Goes After Them.

New York, Nov. 3.—Policeman Frank Brady, of the West Sixty-eighth street station, was beaten and shot and left for dead by a crowd of San Juan Hill negroes last night. Half an hour later, after he had been revived and cared for by surgeons, he refused to stay in the hospital, but went out on post "to get those fellows."

"Bill Doo," a negro, shot Isaac Shanklin, of No. 28 West sixty-first street, in the right ankle in a fight near his home yesterday afternoon. Roosevelt Hospital he asked Policeman Brady to get "Bill Doo."

Brady went on post at Sixty-first street and Amsterdam avenue at 7 o'clock last night. He had not been there long when "Bill Doo" appeared. He caught him by the shoulders and told him he was a prisoner.

"All right," said the negro; and then turning his head, he cried, "Hi, fellows, come up."

A dozen negroes appeared. They told Brady to release his prisoner. Brady drew his club, but he didn't have a chance to swing it, because the twelve were on him, and wrenched the club away from him. He went down like a

log under a blow and the gang jumped on him and kicked and beat him.

When he was almost unconscious and unable to struggle, the gang called "Bill Doo," he says—knelt on him and went through his pockets, taking his revolver. "Bill Doo" stood up and, picking the revolver from the pocket, he pointed it at the prostrate policeman. The shot went wild and was greeted with a yell from the negroes. "Bill Doo" shot a second time. The bullet struck the helpless Brady on the side of the head and glanced off.

The shock made Brady senseless and the negroes, believing they had killed him, took to their heels.

Some one ran to the West Sixty-eighth street station, crying that Brady had been killed. An Captain Handy called his reserves and rushed to the corner. They found Brady just coming to his senses and sent him to Roosevelt Hospital. The reserves were scattered through the district, but they made no arrests.

Brady's uniform was torn, his hat was crushed, his face and body were cut from kicks and blows and he had a long wound at the right side of his head, where the bullet, nevertheless, when the doctors had swathed him in bandages, he said:

"I don't see any use of my staying

UPROAR IN VIENNA.

Socialists Threaten to Follow in Path of Russ Workmen.

Vienna, Nov. 2.—Grave disorders, in which it is reported more than forty persons were injured, occurred to-night as the result of a great Socialist meeting in behalf of the universal suffrage. The orators used fiery language, declaring that millions of workers were ready to follow the Russian example.

The crowds outside the hall were so great that traffic was stopped for three hours. After further harangues outside the buildings the crowd marched through the streets shouting for revolution.

Near the Hofburg the police forced the demonstrators to enter the side streets, causing numerous conflicts, in which several persons were severely injured, the wild scenes lasting half an hour.

Later at night the turbulence was renewed in many parts of the city and many persons were hurt.

The Socialists stoned the police, compelling them to draw their swords and the police acted with brutal violence. The masses resisted angrily. Altogether about 80 persons were injured and surgeons are busy dressing their wounds.
