PAISLEY'S DEATH ACCIDENTAL

one of the switchmen. There was an interval of fifteen minutes between the time they had passed Richmond street and the time the eastern flyer had come in. Witness, on examining his engine in the presence of the coroner, found much blood about it. He had been able to see the tracks clearly and had noticed no one. He had heard no sounds whatever, except those made by the eastbound freight in passing.

To a jurymen, witness stated there was no steam escaping from the pipe at the end of the cars attached to the engine. The accident must have occurred when the engine was going east. Witness said the only explanation he could give for the body being found on Richmond street was that it had been dragged there.

Mr. Cook's Evidence.

Wm. Cook, who first noticed the body, said he found it about 7:35 while walking home. He stepped on a coat and that attracted his attention.

Mr. Stewart, who was with him, said it was an old garment, and advised him to throw it away. He did so, and a moment later found the body on the north track. Witness called the crossing watchman, who came at once. From where the body was found it was evident it had not been touched by the eastern flyer.

The Yard Foreman.

Yard Foreman Fred Hatherley stated that he knew nothing of the accident until told of it by his brother.

When yard engine 29 went east he was standing about 120 feet west of Richmond street. The engine and tender would be east of Richmond street at this time. Witness noticed nothing unusual.

Hatherley said he had been on the rear end of the west coach while they were backing down, and had a lantern with him.

John Delaney, crossing watchman, next called, offered similar evidence.

Talked With Paisley.

John Black, a G. T. R. officer, stated that he had been talking to Mr. Paisley about 7 o'clock. He had left him when the eastern flyer came in. About 7:50 witness heard that Paisley had been killed. A little girl named McIntyre came and said her father could not work, as her mother was ill. Witness suggested to the car foreman to put Paisley on, and the last thing Paisley had said was to thank Black for getting him the extra work.

Finding of the Body.

Fred Sharratt, car cleaner, offered similar evidence. He had known it was Paisley by the tools he found along the track. His lantern was badly broken up. The lantern lay between the tracks.

Car Foreman Flynn corroborated the evidence of John Black. To Mr. Alf Bayley he said that he had told Paisley that he would have to work that night.

Family Reunion.

A family reunion was held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. Calcott, Millbank, on New Year's Day, to greet Mr. and Mrs. D. Boughner, of Ningo, Mo., friends from London, St. Thomas, Frome and Calder sat down to an old-time Yuletide feast. Mr. and Mrs. Boughner intend returning to the west in the course of a few days.
