M'CLARY'S TAKE NO CHANCES WITH FIRE

Company Contemplates Installing a Sprinkler System in South End.

That the McClary Company are taking immediate action to prevent any conflagration sweeping through their big plant in the south end was shown by the following letter read at the meeting of the water commission ers yesterday afternoon:

"We have in contemplation, the in stallation of a sprinkler system of fire protection in a portion of our plant on Adelaide and Trafalgar streets comprising our powerhouse, mounting and finishing shops on the north east corner of Adelaide and Trafalgar streets, and storage warehouse on the southeast corner of the same streets the latter being outside the city limits.

To enable us to complete this installation it is necessary that we have connection with the 6-inch main on Adelaide street. We would like to have permission to connect with this main as a primary supply for our system. As a secondary supply, we are contemplating putting in a 1,000-gal on underwriters' pump between the powerhouse and the river, the pump to operate in a well fed by gravity commence this work this winter and larged to have nowled and which is alwould be glad if you would give the matter your prompt consideration.'
