subject of prayer, taking as his text Luke xi., 1: "Lord, teach us to pray." "The greatest of all blessings," said the speaker. "Come through prayer, and perhaps we Christians are weaker here than anywhere else, so tonight we vill go into the school of prayer, to earn what prayer should mean to us.

"The first thing we need to learn in prayer is reverence. Christ taught us hat no one was more reverent than He. And we must learn this if we ould have power. Abraham praying for Sodom spoke of himself as dust and ashes in God's sight. Moses must take off his shoes when he met God face to face in the burning bush. Job speaking to God abhorred himself in lust and ashes in God's sight. Daniel poke of Him as a great and dreadful God. Everywhere is reverence. So as we approach the Almighty we must do it carefully, more carefully than we ould approach any earthly sovereign.

Prayer and Sin. "No prayer can be effective without onfession of sin. The Pharisees prayed long and publicly, but they did not acknowledge their sin and so their progress was ineffectual.
