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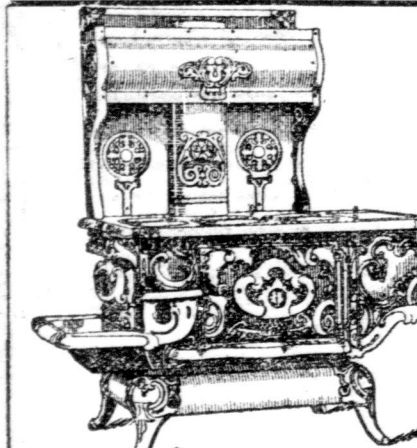

VICTORIA HOSPITAL IS BUSY INSTITUTION

During the month 196 were admitted—67 males, 78 females, and 50 children. At the same time 182 were discharged—61 males, 78 females, and 43 children.

There were 18 births, 12 deaths, and 58 operations. The total receipts were \$2,993.43.

HOTELMAN'S SUICIDE.

Plattsburg, N. Y., Sept. 24.—Fredrick L. Hinds, of Au Sable Forks, a well-known Adirondack hotel man, committed suicide last night by shooting himself in the head with a rifle. Temporary insanity resulting from injuries received in a recent fall from a horse is supposed to have been the cause.

SPIRIT OF REVIVAL IS VERY STRONG

A Large Audience Last Night Heard Rev. Mr. Goforth in St. Andrew's Hall

THE VALUE OF PRAYER

A Stirring Sermon by the Eloquent Preacher—Pray and Forgive.

That a strong spirit of revival is beginning to touch the church members of London was amply evidenced by the gathering held in St. Andrew's Hall last night. The building was crowded to its utmost capacity, and in the audience that faced Rev. Mr. Goforth there was a very large representation of every Protestant denomination in the city. Mr. Goforth's appeal for the leaders in the churches to stand behind the movement, is not failing in its effect. In the congregation last night there was gathered the majority of the ministers of the city, and a large number of the prominent laymen from the different churches.

An Earnest Preacher.

Rev. Mr. Goforth speaks very simply, yet with an intense earnestness that must have the effect of giving his words a vital power in the lives of his hearers.

Last night Mr. Goforth spoke on the subject of prayer, taking as his text Luke xi, 1: "Lord, teach us to pray." "The greatest of all blessings," said the speaker, "come through prayer, and perhaps we Christians are weaker here than anywhere else, so tonight we will go into the school of prayer, to learn what prayer should mean to us."

"The first thing we need to learn in prayer is reverence. Christ taught us that no one was more reverent than He. We must learn this if we would have power. Abraham praying for Sodom spoke of himself as dust and ashes in God's sight. Moses cried out of his shoes when he met God face to face in the burning bush. Job speaking to God abhorred himself in dust and ashes in God's sight. Daniel spoke of himself as a great and godly God. Everywhere is reverence. So as we approach the Almighty we must do it carefully, more carefully than we would approach any earthly sovereign."

Prayer and Sin.

"No prayer can be effective without confession of sin. The Pharisees prayed long and publicly, but they did not acknowledge their sin and so their prayers were Pharaoh's. Pharaoh spoke of his sin, but it was because suffering had touched him, and there was no real repentance. But with Job, the perfect man, it was far otherwise, and he saw the sin in his life and confessed it earnestly."

"Isaiah spoke of himself as a man of unclean lips, and his lips were purified, and so it was with the great New England revival under Jonathan Edwards. He saw the same need and cried out of it, and in our own churches we must have the same thing. We must acknowledge our sins and confess them before God. It is impossible for God to use some of us because of the sin that is in us, and sin must be got rid of if we are to be used."

"And Jesus would also teach the principle of confession. If we have sinned against any man we must make amends."

Pray and Forgive.

"When we pray and pray with effect we must forgive. There are people hindering God's work, and jeopardizing their own salvation because they won't forgive. You have your little differences. This one has said a word awry and that one has made a slighting remark, but oh how petty these things are. We must forgive. We must leave faith in prayer. David was the only one who met Goliath because he was the only one who had faith in the living God, and we have lost ground terribly and have failed, often miserably, because we have not been like David with a strong belief in prayer."

"There must be unity as well as faith. One church becomes a mighty united stream, they will sweep matters before them. And a great many churches fail for this very lack of unity. The devil gets in on that line and there is no power to pray. If all the churches were united in their desire, there would not be room to receive the message of the Holy Spirit upon them. We must have thanksgiving. It was by this that Paul won his victories. We are so pitifully decadent that there is really nothing to appeal to those who are away for Christ. Let there be more praise and there will be more victory in London."

Submit to God's Will.

"There must be submission to God's will. But we must guard this submission carefully. It is a devil's lie that God does not want us to pray for certain things."

"Do not accept the excuse often as matter of mere laziness. We must pray until we know what God wants of us and then submit to his will. Then there must be repetition. It might be the worst thing that could happen to us if our prayers were answered immediately. How near we come to getting the blessing, and fall because we do not persist in our petitions."

"The reason why the churches are so low down is that the intercessors have taken a holiday and have not been diligent in the Master's business. But only as we learn to pray. He taught us we can hope for great things from Him."

Board of Works Last Night Again Took a Fall Out of the Question
