\$10,000 Race.

THIRD WIN OF SEASON

Geers Has Captured Three \$10,000
Events in As Many Weeks—The
Results.

Detroit, Aug. 3.—The Merchants' and Manufacturers' \$10,000 stake was won easily in straight heats at the Fair Grounds today by the little black mare Dudge Archdale, with Geers in the sulky. The race was too one-sided to be exciting and the odds of 3 to 1 on Dudge Archdale minimized the interest in the betting.

Today's feature race was the third \$10,000 event that the black trotter has won in as many weeks, the other two having been the Futurity Manufacturers' stake at Grand Rapids and the Paper Mills' stake at Kalamazoo.

Geers was applauded each time he hobbled out on a crutch to his sulky, not having recovered entirely from his accident at Grand Rapids. This week's meeting is the second blue ribbon Detroit meeting, at which Geers won both the Merchants' and Manufacturers' stakes, two of the biggest annual events of the trotting turf. Summaries:

Every year it is suggested that new angles are impossible, but before the season's end so many new kinks are found that even the veterans are amazed. Take this year. Didn't Connie Mack throw a bomb into baseballdom with the statement that he had paid \$12,000 for Russell? And now we have the interesting phenomenon of Geo. Edward "Rube" Waddell "sober as a judge." If this isn't enough for one year, the fans ought to have their rain checks taken away. "Rube" hasn't been of value to himself or anyone else, save spacewriters, for a year or more. His fondness for whiskey made him about as reliable as one of those 39-cent alarm clocks.

But Waddell has "straightened up." No longer does he wend his way homeward in the wee sma' hours, stopping at every third parlor. Without desiring to cause heart disease in fandom, it is stated that the famous stonewaller is trying the celebrated hydropathic, which is lofty dome talk for water wagon—course, prescribed by Police Judge Pollard, of St. Louis.
