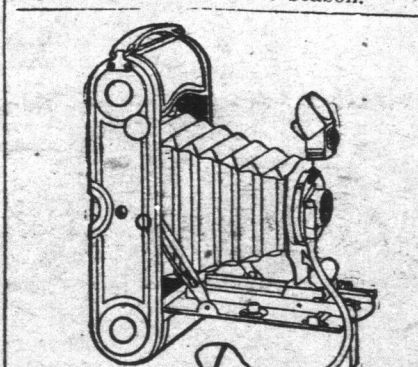

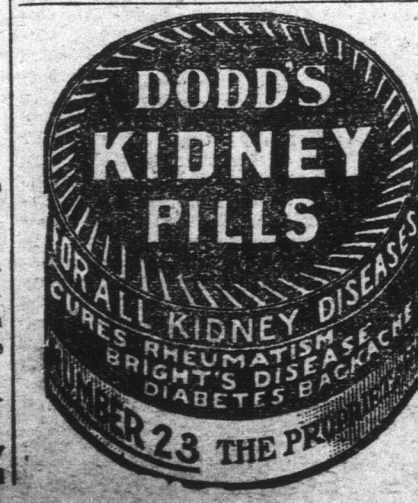
Was a Printer.

**MORE TALK OF**  
**A NEW HOTEL**

Land Bonded on Richmond St.,  
It Is Said, for \$300,000  
Hostelry.

**DEPENDS ON CITY HALL**

Unless the New Civic Building Goes  
There, New Yorkers Will Not  
Spend Their Money Here.

Negotiations for a new hotel in Lon-  
don to cost \$300,000 were practically  
closed yesterday afternoon, it is said,  
and the promoters are confident that  
work will be commenced on the propo-  
sition at an early date.  
The Western Hotel property, at the  
corner of Richmond and Fullerton  
street, and the Morrison property at  
the rear on Fullerton street, have been  
bonded, and a deposit made on the  
purchase price.

The capital for the enterprise will be  
furnished by Toronto and New York  
parties, although some local money will  
be put in the enterprise, it is claimed.  
The promoters were in the city yester-  
day afternoon, and closed up the  
land part of the deal, it is announced.  
Mr. John R. Minihnick has been se-  
curing the options for some time, and  
yesterday all the land needed was  
secured. The price for the whole prop-  
erty was about \$60,000. Mr. Jennings  
is to be paid \$30,000 for his hotel if the  
new project goes through.

Money No Object.  
According to Mr. Minihnick, the  
men behind the proposition have plenty  
of capital. They control a string of  
hotels throughout the United States,  
and will erect several in Canada. To-  
ronto and Hamilton will follow Lon-  
don, and the promoters will begin  
work there as soon as work on the  
local hotel is completed.

They spent the entire day here Fri-  
day, and looked over the deal. An  
architect accompanied them, in order  
to get an idea of the site on which the  
hotel is to be erected. The building  
will be six stories high, and of the  
most modern fireproof construction.  
The first story will be altogether of  
stone, while the upper stories will be  
brick and steel.

The promoters will return next week  
with completed plans, and tenders will  
be called for the construction of the  
building as soon as possible.  
Land Is Bonded.  
"We have bonded the land, and made  
a deposit on the purchase price," said  
Mr. Minihnick. "The men behind the  
enterprise have the capital, and it is  
quite certain that the proposition will  
go. There are a few details to ar-  
range, and these will be cleared away  
next week."

The promoters saw Mayor Graham  
and Mr. J. Grant Henderson, commis-  
sioner of industries, and discussed the  
situation with them. Neither of them  
would give out any information as to  
what the promoters wanted the city to  
do. It is understood that they want  
the corporation to guarantee a certain  
portion of the bonds.

An If in the Deal.  
It is also understood that the deal is  
contingent upon the city council  
placing the city hall on the Richmond  
and Maple street intersection.  
The promoters intend taking over  
the Western Hotel property at an ear-  
ly date, and run the hotel until the  
new building is ready.

**MAKING READY**  
**FOR BIG SHOW**

Western Fair Will Be Greatest  
in the History of the  
Exhibition.

**MEN WORKING STEADILY**

Dog Show Will Be Big Feature—Live  
Stock Entries More Numerous  
Than Ever Before.

The Western Fair is looming up  
larger and better than ever this year,  
and entries are pouring in so fast that  
Secretary Hurst intends to increase his  
office staff immediately. The number  
of entries on hand to date exceed that  
for the same day last year.

The fair grounds are the scene of  
the greatest activity. Scores of work-  
men are working daily, rain or shine,  
to get things in shape. Evidently a  
great deal of money is being spent  
on improvements on the grounds and  
in the buildings as well. The Dundas  
street entrance, the general office and  
the band stand have all received fresh  
coats of paint and—sent a very  
finished appearance. Six clusters of  
lights have been installed in the vicin-  
ity of the main entrance, and the  
turnstiles at the entrances have been  
examined and repaired.

A stair has  
been erected at each end of the grand-  
stand from the upper story to the  
ground, which facilitates a great deal  
the emptying of the stands when they  
are crowded. On the stage in front of  
the grandstand a 75-foot row of foot-  
lights have been installed.

The Main Building.  
The space in the Main Building has  
been all taken up; several firms have  
been refused the privilege of placing  
exhibits on account of the lack of  
space there. Many firms exhibiting  
have men at work preparing the sec-  
tion and vying with each other as to  
arrangements and show.

The stock barns have been cleaned  
out, and are being bedded with straw.  
These will be filled to capacity this  
year. Two big entries have been re-  
ceived from Edmonton and Calgary,  
and more are expected. It is up to  
the farmers of Ontario to retain their  
lads over the prize-winning west-  
erners.

The Horticultural and Agricultural  
Buildings are going to be veritable  
fairgrounds, and will please even the  
most pessimistic eye. The inside of  
these buildings is being shrouded  
with green cedars and fifteen dozen  
suspended Union Jacks will display  
the national colors. The Asylum at  
London Junction have engaged one  
entire end of the Agricultural Hall and  
their exhibit will show the results of  
this year's effort in field husbandry.  
The C. F. B. are next to them, and  
will have a splendid exhibit.

The Poultry Building will have a  
large collection of the finest fowls in  
Canada.

The Dog Show has been done away  
with, but the canine show will be one  
of the best on the grounds. The ever-  
popular and pleasing Midway will pro-  
vide the amusement part to the ex-
