GUILTY OF FORGERY

George Rice Now Admits That He Issued Bad Check.

Ingersoll, Jan. 8.—If he can make restitution, George Rice, of Orwell, will be dealt with leniently on the charge of forgery and uttering a check to which he pleaded guilty today before Magistrate Patterson. He made it payable to George Smith, and signed the name of Fred Hickey, a farmer, of West Oxford. Only a short time before he had been in and presented a good check signed in this way. When the owner was away at dinner he came back and passed the other.

WINDSOR AND SANDWICH CONSIDER ANNEXATION

Deafeat of Hydro Has Brought the Question To the Front

Windsor, Jan. 8.—The defeat of the hydro-electric proposition by Sandwich has given life to the old issue of the consolidation of Windsor and Sandwich. Sandwich will have to spend \$100,000 to modernize itself, according to Secretary McCormick, of the Sandwich Board of Trade, and this fact, it is declared, has given a favorable turn to the proposition, to the minds of many Sandwich people.

LIBRARY BOARD WILL AGAIN SEEK CARNEGIE LIBRARY

Deputation Will Go to New York In The Interests of New Building.

DR. TEASDALL OPPOSED

Declares London Is Big Enough To Look After Its Own Needs.

Although the Carnegie library situation was not discussed at the meeting of the library board last night it remains with the board to take the next move in the matter of negotiating for a Carnegie grant. It is probable that a special committee will shortly lay the situation before the Carnegie corporation in New York and a special meeting of the board will likely be called to consider the matter some time during the next weeks.

Will Be Resumed.
On account of the death of the late Rev. Dr. James Ross while in New York on the Carnegie library mission, negotiations with the Carnegie corporation were interrupted for a time, but it is understood that they will shortly be resumed. The Advertiser was informed that there would be no new communications from the Carnegie corporation until the next step in the negotiations is taken by the board.

Opposes Any Grant.
Another phase of the Carnegie library question cropped up at the first meeting of the board of education last night, when Trustee Dr. W. J. Teasdale, moving the reappointment of W. H. Winnett as one of the board's representatives on the public library board, took firm exception to asking Carnegie or any other "Scotchman or American" to contribute to a new London library.

London Large Enough.
London, said Dr. Teasdale, was quite large enough to look after her own needs in this direction, and he felt that if a new library was needed her citizens were public-spirited enough to pay the shot.

Hesselberg to Teach in London.
Those who heard Mr. Edouard Hesselberg, a well-known French pianist, a few weeks ago, and were so charmed by the unaffected naturalness of his personality as well as by his masterful performance, will be delighted to know that he is now to be a member of the conservatory staff, and will in future receive pupils at his studio there. Mr. Hesselberg stands high in the ranks of his profession, and is a composer of merit as well as a teacher of remarkable success and broad experience. Mr. Hesselberg's coming to London as a teacher of piano is another evidence of the progressiveness and enthusiasm of the present management of the London Conservatory of Music, which is now considered the finest in Western Ontario, and one of the best in Canada. A more commodious building was first found necessary; then followed the affiliation with the Western University. A year ago Mr. Ernest Shildrick was added to the vocal department, Mr. Maurice Pourie has recently taken charge of the violin department, and Mr. Hesselberg is now the latest addition to the staff. The names of Miss Jennie Steele, Mrs. Lotta Francis-Vining, Miss Helen Patterson, Miss Bessie Moore, Miss Gertrude Rennie, Miss Beatrice Gibson, Miss Kathleen O'Meara, Miss Amelia Danglefield, Miss Irene Burns, Madeline Simson and Mr. Chas. Percy are well known as those of teachers of exceptional ability and add strength to the piano department of the London Conservatory of Music.

MIDDLESEX FRUIT GROWERS WILL MAKE WAR ON ALL MIDDLEMEN

Decide To Get In Touch With The Grain Growers' Association In The West and Sell All Their Products Direct.

The London branch of the Middlesex Fruit Growers' Association held an enthusiastic meeting at the Department of Agriculture, King street, on Thursday afternoon. There was a large attendance of members, and many important matters were discussed.

President W. C. Pack opened the meeting and stated that the London branch had proved itself last year to be indispensable to the growers, and this year they ever hoped to accomplish greater things. The fruit men, he said, were no longer engaged in cutting prices against each other, but were pulling grandly together. Dr. Ross addressed the growers on berry box and basket manufacture. For years he had been thinking of operating a box factory at Byron. He hoped to give them further information on the matter after he had himself gone further into the subject. He stated that basswood was the best lumber for baskets, but the timber was very scarce.

Mr. J. Mair, a prominent farmer from the west, addressed the growers on co-operation. He believed if the fruit men in Ontario dealt with the consumers in the west direct, a big trade could be worked up, not only for apples, but all kinds of small fruits.

He was prepared to discuss the matter with the farmers there. Western Ontario fruit is looked upon as the finest possible in the world, and is always in big demand. Mr. Mair considered it was a shame the high price people in the west paid for apples from Quebec. The middleman was too grasping and should be put out of business. Let the growers here deal direct with the Grain Growers' Association in the west, and the difficulty would be solved immediately.

The meeting unanimously resolved to get into communication with the Grain Growers' Association in the west.

NORTH END SCHOOL IS BADLY NEEDED

In Inaugural Address Chairman Hunt of Board of Education Refers to Pressing Demands.

Trustee A. M. Hunt, the new chairman of the board of education, in submitting his inaugural address to the board on Thursday night, drew the attention of the board to the need of a new school in the northeastern part of the city, to relieve the overcrowding in St. George's and Quebec street schools, and also the need of a new school or its equivalent on Grand avenue.

Princess avenue school, said the chairman, was also much in need of attention, and it was desirable that a new school be added to the board last year.

Other desirable improvements and additions were also pointed out, but those mentioned were considered by the chairman to be the most necessary.

An extension of the playgrounds system was advocated by the chairman. He was also an effort to educate the foreigners who are constantly coming into London.

Trustee Hunt also put in a strong word in favor of making the school grounds more attractive, and suggested that the co-operation of the London Horticultural Society be asked.

Mrs. Goold was originally sentenced to be guillotined, and her husband was sentenced to life imprisonment. The woman's sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life, owing to the outcry against an execution taking place in the principality of Monaco.

MRS. VIOLET GOOLD DEAD IN A FRENCH PRISON

Former Montreal Woman Sent to Jail For Life For Slaying Emma Levin.

[Canadian Press.]
Montpellier, France, Jan. 8.—Mrs. Violet Goold, who with her husband, Vere St. Ledger Goold, was serving a term of life imprisonment for the murder of Emma Levin in the summer of 1907, the crime being known as "The Monte Carlo Trunk Mystery," died in prison today.
