

IN A FRENCH PRISON

Jail For Life For Slaying Emma Levin.

[Canadian Press.] Montpellier, France, Jan. 8.—Mrs. Violet Goold, who with her husband, Vere St. Ledger Goold, was serving a term of life imprisonment for the mur der of Emma Levin in the summer of 1907, the crime being known as "The

1907, attracted great attention because of the enormity of the crime, the manner in which the murder was committed, and the dramatic arrest of the principals, who were taken by the police while seeking to escape with a trunk containing portions of the body of their victim. The murdered woman had been lured by the Goolds to their ville and robbed of valuable jewelry Her dismembered body was packed in a trunk, which was shipped to Mar-seilles, the trunk later being found among the baggage of the Goolds. The Goolds were for years residents of Montreal.

Mrs. Goold was originally sentenced to be guillotined, and her husband was sentenced to life imprisonment. The woman's sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life, owing to the The trial of the Goolds in December, place in the principality of Monaco.
