

Winnipeg, Oct. 10.—Mr. Justice Haggart this morning gave judgment that the warrants committing the four Winnipeg newspapermen to jail for contempt of court should be quashed and applicants discharged from custody. He ruled that Commissioner Galt in sending Edward Beck, B. R. W. Deacon, Stanley Beck and Knox Magee to jail exceeded his powers.

A Commissioner's Powers. Mr. Justice Haggart said he had heard the original application with regret but what he had learned subsequently had more than justified him in hearing it. A judge sitting as a comnissioner had, he said, no greater cower than any other citizen who might be appointed commissioner. Brilish and French Infantry Charge Through Solid Sheet of German Shell and Sweeping Beyond Object Carry Position That Gives Them Upper Hand in Battle for Perronne-Bapaume Roads-Vast Army of Soldiers Preparing Roads for Continuous Advances During Fall and

London, Oct. 10 .- 1:45 p.m .- "At dawn this morning," says an official statement issued by the British war department today, "enemy infantry in the open in the neighborhood of Grandcourt were caught under our artillery fire.

"A successful raid was made by us last night southwest of Givenchy. The enemy's trenches were entered, although they were held with con siderable strength. Two dugouts were bombed. Casualties were inflicted on the enemy."

Oct. 10-Despite the almost constant rain of the past ten days the Allies have methodically and uninterrupt edly continued their northeastward rush, until they have finally captured the dominating points of Sailly Sailliesle on the crest of the ridge, over which runs the Bapaume-Peronne road.

CAMPAIGN ALL WINTER. With the advent of the autumn rainy season the French are employing vast armies of men constructing permanent corduroy and macadam roads. These will permit the continuation of operations both fall and winter, and will not permit the Germans to take advantage of a winter full to re-entrench and re-fortify THE FINAL DASH.

From a point beyond Combles we saw the final dash of French and British infantry that drove the Germans from positions about Sailly. The German gunners were throwing up a solid wall of barrage fire along the tine miles' front, extending from Morval to Bouchavesne to prevent the impending attack. When the barrage reached its greatest intensity the view was entirely cut off by a curtain of bursting shells, flames, smoke and clouds of earth and dust shooting skyward. It was to see slightest detail of the attack which the officer had brought us to see.
