## MUSICAL ART READY TO OPEN FIFTH TERM

Heavy Enrollment Is Expected  
At This Popular London Institution.

## KU KLUX KLAN SESSION IS BROKEN UP BY MOB

Perth Amboy, N. J., Police and Firemen Unable To Control Indignant Citizens.

Perth Amboy, N. J., Aug. 30.—A crowd of 5,000 persons broke up a meeting of the Ku Klux Klan in the Oddfellows' Hall tonight, 75 police and 150 firemen being unable to drive back the throng that stormed the building. Firemen drove trucks into the mass of people, but to no avail. A hurry call was sent for state police in Trenton. Patrolmen fired shots in the air, threw gas bombs and swung their night sticks, while firemen turned streams of water on the fighting throng.

Chief Tenneson, in the meantime, had ordered the klansmen to leave the building. Clamoring out windows, down fire escapes and through every available exit, they were met by their assailants, and many hand-to-hand fights ensued.

**BRANTFORD POLICE SEARCH  
FOR MISSING NORFOLK MAN**

Brantford, Aug. 30.—Missing from his home in Woodhouse Township, Norfolk County, for more than a week, the aid of the Brantford police has been enlisted by County Constable Robert Alway of Simcoe, in a search for Stanley William Austin. The cause for Austin's sudden and mysterious disappearance is not known, and his friends are endeavoring to learn his present whereabouts. When last seen, Austin, who is 19 years old, and weighs 175 pounds, was dressed in a blue suit and cap, and tan canvas shoes. A description of him received by the police here, gives his height as six feet, dark brown hair, blue eyes and medium complexion.

He disappeared from his home on the night of Wednesday, August 22, and has not been seen since.

## ORDERS 2,000 BUFFALO SOON BE SLAUGHTERED

Canadian Government Finds It Has No Use For So Many of Those Animals.

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—The Dominion of Canada has 2,000 surplus buffalo, and they are to be slaughtered. These unwanted members of a race of animals which has been showing signs of disappearing, are now wandering on the range in the National Park at Wainwright, Sask. For some years the Dominion government has been paying special attention to the preservation of these animals, and so successful has this work been that the accommodation in the national parks is being overtaxed. Consequently 2,000 of the buffaloes are to be killed this fall and the meat and skins sold. The contract for the slaughter of the animals has been given by order-in-council to A. S. Ducloux of Edmonton, who performed similar services for the government on a smaller scale last year, when 250 head of buffalo were killed.

## PORT LAMBTON REPORTS DISTRICT CROPS GOOD

Port Lambton, Aug. 30.—The cool weather of the past few days in this locality has given a setback to the corn crop, which was advancing toward maturity during the hot weather. The late potatoes are doing well and prospects are good for a fair yield. Sugar-beets are also doing well. Threshing is about wound up here, and the majority of the farmers in the neighborhood are busy hauling manure and getting their land in readiness for fall plowing. Rain is badly needed to put the ground in a fit condition for plowing. A few, however, have already done some seeding.

## WIARTON MAN WILL FACE GRAVE CHARGE AT ASSIZES

Heworth, Aug. 30.—The sequel to the finding of a young girl on the Oliphant road by two Owen Sound boys two weeks ago was enacted in Wiarton police court, when Alexander Campbell of Wiarton was arraigned upon a criminal charge. After hearing the evidence of the girl and of the men who picked her up on the road, Campbell was sent up for trial at the fall assizes in Walkerton.

When discovered by the two young men the girl was in a dazed and bleeding condition as a result of injuries sustained in jumping from a car.
