PLEADS MISTAKEN DATES

Mrs. Long Called by Defence To Support Story of Occurrence.

Sarnia Nov. 21.-Dr. James Allan Milne, London dentist, charged with perjury at the original trial of Edward McMullen, the convicted Wyoming bandit, was acquitted by Judge Wallace of Woodstock, in the Lambton County judge criminal court this morning, his honor stating that the crown had not produced sufficient evidence to convince him that perjury was deliberately committed.

J. A. McEvoy, K.C., of London. representing the accused, based his defence on the possibility of a mishad his tooth extracted by defendant and his partner.
