Botanist's Discovery Expected to Save Thousands In Timber Losses

CAUSE OF TIMBER PARASITE FOUND

Botanists' Discovery Will Mean Saving of Thousands.
PROVES HIS THEORY

Swanville, Ont., Aug. 19.—Dr. J. H. Faull, professor of botany at the University of Toronto, has made an important discovery in his battle with parasitic diseases which take an annual toll of timber in the Canadian forests comparable with the damage wrought by fire. A party of thirty botanists from the universities of Great Britain and the United States who attended the meetings of the British association in Toronto recently, visited Professor Faull's tiny laboratory at Bear Island during their botanizing expedition in Timagami yesterday and saw how Professor Faull has been able to produce disease in trees by a method of inoculation.

Blames Berry Bushes.
Professor Faull showed that the white pine blister rust is transmitted alternately through current bushes to the pine trees, the mechanism being similar to the action of the parasites of malaria fever in man, where the invading organisms live first in the tissues of the mosquito and then in the blood of the sufferer and are transferred back again from the human blood stream to the mosquito when it bites a person afflicted with the fever. By inoculating the trees with the spores of fungi and excluding all other means of infection the scientist has proved that the symptoms of the disease are developed and he has been able to decide what coniferous trees are susceptible and what the alternative hosts are which spread the disease. A species of blueberry bush has been shown to blame also for transferring the pine rust, according to the latest research.

The discovery indicates the steps necessary for combatting the disease. The elimination of the current and blueberry bushes would stamp out the disease, but where this is not feasible measures can be taken to protect the trees now known to be susceptible.

Can Inoculate Trees.
The proof that trees can be inoculated with the germs of disease settles a point which has been a subject of debate among botanists. Conflicting views were expressed at the Toronto meetings of the British association. Dr. A. B. Rendel, who directs the botany department of the natural history museum of London, secured specimens of Canadian flora which was originated at the museum in 1870. This should light up the distribution of plant types in Northern Ontario.

A regulated succession of cuttings for pulpwood in the Timagami reserve has been abandoned, the botanists learned.

"This is a great pity," Dr. J. H. Priestley, of the University of Leeds, told the Canadian Press. A depletion will follow unless the present plan is modified, in his opinion.

The botanists joined the special trains heading for the west at Timagami yesterday after four days spent collecting specimens and examining them.

They explored the islands and inlets of Timagami Lake by motor launch and canoe.

Whites Acting As Slaves To the Blacks at Kalahari Found by Locust Expedition

Tragic Fate of Unfortunates in African Desert Is Revealed.
UNDER RIGID RULE

Chief of Tribe Allows Them Only Small Portions of Grain For Wages.

London, Aug. 19.—One of the great African interior by way of Cape Town, comes a pathetic story of a group of white men and women who are living in a state of subjection to blacks, who exercise complete mastery over them.

The tragic fate of these unfortunates has just been revealed in a report which officials of the South African government's locust expedition, now in the interior of the great Kalahari desert, have sent to Cape Town. The expedition went into the interior to study the breeding grounds of locusts. When they arrived at Molopolole, a hundred miles in the interior of the desert, the officials were taken before Sebele, the paramount native chief. They found him well educated, able to speak English fluently, and both he and his wife wore European clothes.

The visitors discovered some fifty white men and women living near the chief's kraal, where they act as servants to the chief and his followers. They are thought to be descendants of old Dutch pioneers, who trekked into the interior, lost themselves in the desert. The horses, overcome with the drought, died, and the pioneers flung themselves on the mercy of the natives who gave them small quantities of grain as wages.

The natives around Molopolole are rich, both in cattle and land. They carry rifles, but the whites are permitted to possess firearms. Chief Sebele dispenses justice to all his tribes, the Bechuanas, who are recognized as the aristocracy of the Kalahari. The Kalahari desert forms the western district of British Bechuanaland, and is about 120,000 square miles in extent. It was first crossed to Lake Ngami by Dr. David Livingstone in 1849.

COL. W. O. HODGINS WILL GO TO IMPERIAL STAFF

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—The important Ottawa unofficially of certain important promotions in the permanent force of Canada which will be announced shortly.

It is understood that Col. W. Gibson, at present director of personal services at headquarters of the department of national defense, Ottawa, is to be given the appointment of general officer commanding at Calgary, to succeed Gen. A. H. Bell, the latter proceeding to Toronto to assume the command of Military District No. 2 in succession to Col. A. H. Borden.

There are also in progress negotiations relative to exchange of officers between Canada and various other parts of the Empire, as was the practice in the years preceding the war, the Journal understands. The first of these movements is the attachment of Col. W. O. Hodgins, D. S. O., to the imperial staff in London, England, for a period of two years. At least one other officer will be sent to the British war office, while plans are under way for despatching additional officers to Australia and New Zealand.

CUBS FROM LONDON DEN TO TRY EARLY FISHING
A number of members of the Lions' Club of London are going to arise at 4 o'clock tomorrow morning and set out for Port Rowan in expectancy of catching fish. Any member of the fishy tribe will do, no matter if it be white, black, or herring.

There will be 20 men in the party and all hope to bring home some fish, and are sure that they will, no matter how they get them. The reason they are going to Port Rowan is the fact that there are many fish tugs go out from that place, and if they are not successful in getting the fish by their own hook and line then the fishermen are always willing to sell.

QUEBEC ST. SEWER SOON A REALITY

Engineer's Department Starts Project Yesterday—500 Men on Payroll.

STORMY TIME

Work on the Quebec street storm sewer was started yesterday by the city engineer and at last after many months of playing shuttle cock back and forward between opposing camps the sewer is on the way. When the storm sewer on this street was first mentioned it was merely as a sewer. Later, the idea of pavement occurred to someone and became part of the plan. There were several objections to this on the part of the residents, which was generally thought to include the sewer.

Finally it was understood that there was no objection to the sewer, in fact that it was very much needed. The council agreed that the work should be done, after the attorney-general and the city solicitor had been consulted as to the legality of using part of the \$200,000 allotted in the city of London bill for storm sewers was obtained. It will mean that Quebec street this winter and next spring will be a possible roadway and that the residents will now be able to sell their canoes.

The city engineer's gangs are also starting on storm sewers on Lock-year street and Riverview Heights, and on the syphon work at the foot of Wellington street in connection with the Wellington street sewer.

Over five hundred men are now on the payroll of the city in the engineering department, he says, it is quite a job to keep them all busy in the wet weather. He took on ten more men yesterday.

Many Re-Marry During August

Several Divorced Couples Decide To Try Again.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—June is said to be the month of roses and marriage, but August is the month of re-marriage, according to a new Williams, issuer of marriage licenses, at the city hall.

"On July 19 last," said Mr. Williams, "the royal assent was received to a large number of divorce petitions. Up until today, August 19, I have issued licenses to no less than eleven of the couples whose divorces were made absolute on July 19, to re-marry each other. I was also today forced to refuse a license to a man to wed a lady because he was already married to her. He said his name was for a desire to repeat the ceremony a statement that since his marriage several years ago he had lost his wife. The divorce of his name was duly recorded, a second marriage ceremony would be illegal, and I was forced to refuse him."

EVACUATION CONTINUES IN GERMAN TERRITORY

Paris, Aug. 19.—The evacuation by French troops of Belgium yesterday morning of Offenber and Kehl, was completed last night without incident. Two columns of the 8th Hussars from Strasbourg and a company of the 17th Infantry from Kehl, which formed the entire occupying force, numbering something less than two hundred men, have rejoined their garrisons, and the two towns on the east bank of the Rhine, across from Strasbourg, have left not a single one of the foreign soldiers who entered their limits Feb. 4, 1923, when the occupation was ordered as a penalty for the suspension of service on German sections of two international railway routes.

TWO DAUGHTERS NOT CONNECTED WITH CASE

THEUNIS MAKES REPORT OF CONFERENCE TO KING

Brussels, Aug. 19.—Premier Theunis yesterday made a detailed report to King Albert on the proceedings and results of the international conference in London, whereupon the monarch abandoned his intention to pre-empt the next cabinet meeting, at which Mr. Theunis will make his official report on the accord concluded during the London negotiations.

TEAM IS PURCHASED.

A fine upstanding team has just been purchased by the Public Utilities Commission, half Percheron and half Clyde. Dr. C. S. Tamblin, city veterinarian inspector, who has inspected the team, says that it is a perfectly matched pair, heavy enough for the work it will have to do, and a good buy at the price. The team will take over its new duties tomorrow.

STATE ALIENIST LAST TO TESTIFY

Judicial Hearing in Leopold-Loeb Case Drawing to Close.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 19.—Courtney raised to the high degree marked the cross-examination today of Dr. William O. Krohn, state alienist, and last witness in the judicial hearing which is to determine the punishment of Nathan Leopold, Jun., and Richard Loeb for the kidnapping and murder of Robert Franks.

Yesterday's proceedings when the expert and Benjamin Bachrach, of counsel for the defense, shouted angry reports back and forth, there were smiles and "please" exchanges today. The expert punctiliously used "sir" in every answer, and the attorney never failed to address the witness as "doctor."

Dr. Krohn once found occasion to dig the defense alienist's theories, explaining that he had given no formal opinion on the mentalities of the defendants since June 1, and that newspaper interviews quoting him on that point resulted from his attempts to explain "exaggerated claims made by the defense."

"You mean that the reporters told you these exaggerations were offered by the defense, did you not?" asked Mr. Bachrach.

"Not entirely. Anyway I tried to explain them for the boys," was the answer. "Ask him if he could explain them."
