John Pringle's Hobby Is Breeding Jersey Cattle

A Visit To "Woodview Farm" Finds Prominent London Financial Man At Home With His Prize Herd.

Just a mile or so west of the city the animals have been imported from the Jersey Island within the last few years to fill up the gaps caused by animals which have been sent farther afield.

Just now, "Merrivale Beautiful Prince," one of the finest animals in the herd, is booked to sail from Vancouver for New Zealand on July 20, and "Rowers Flying Fox" is leaving for Quebec immediately.

The Jerseys recently out from the island are wearing metal chains about their horns, padlocked, and bearing the number registered in Jersey. The keys of the padlocks remain in the island, and the chains are never supposed to be removed. This is the Jersey system for keeping track of her animals.

More Prize Animals. Some of the other prize animals are "Woodview Bright Prince," grand champion at the Western Fair last year; "Rowers Golden Princess," first prize yearling at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto; "Rowers Golden Lass," second prize yearling at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto; "Rowers Benedictine Glory," first prize cow at the Western Fair last year; "Rowers Charm," first prize two-year-old at the National Dairy Show at Springfield, Mass.; "Lady Alice," winner of first prize in Toronto for three years in succession.

Among the interesting things to be seen in the stables was a day-old calf which gives promise of being a prize-winning animal some day. A half dozen or so kittens, falling over each other in their play, also lent a homey picturesqueness to the scene. But Jerseys are merely one branch, although the most important branch of the splendid stock farm owned by Mr. Pringle.

There are the "Woodview Poultry Yards" to be considered. Here 500 "youngsters," as Mr. Pringle calls them, and 100 grown birds are to be found in the large summer runs. Behind is the poultry house, a most modern building, where the hens and chickens live in a modern way. The birds are Barred Rocks, with handsome grey plumage, and Rhode Island Reds, beautifully dark in color. And among them are many prize winners. Shetland ponies, too, have a place in this interesting farm. There are 20 of these prize animals, among them half a dozen Shetland colts. There are sheep, too. And even colts and dogs are bred at "Woodview Farm."

It is interesting to visit the stables with the owner, for the person who may consider him rather distant when they meet him in the city, would be altogether disillusioned if they saw him among his cattle. The little Jerseys follow him about like dogs and push their soft noses into his hand. They don't seem to comprehend that there is a possibility that they might not be "wanted."

"They seem to know you. I didn't think cows had enough intelligence for that," was a remark addressed to him. Then Mr. Pringle told the story of "Seaside Lass." How he sold her in St. Paul, Minnesota, for \$2,500 and then bought her back at an auction sale a year later for \$1,000. And how, when she arrived at Woodview again, she calmly walked into her own stall, without being shown the way.

Sire of all the Rowers. The Woodview stables are beautifully kept, each animal having its own stall, with the name appearing above. Cement floors make the daily cleaning of the stalls an easy matter. The animals are sleek and well-kept, and are really very handsome. All save poor old "Rowers," the sire of all the Rowers, who is 15 years old, and looks his age. He is, indeed, a veteran Jersey, as the average life is but about 12 years. A large number of
