STABBING CASE AT CHATHAM HEAD

Basil Malley Held in Newcastle Jail on a Serious Charge

Newcastle, N. B. June 22.—Basil Malley, of Chatham Head, is in the county jail here charged with attempted murder and George Bennett, of the same place, is nursing a badly cut neck as the result of an altercation there last evening.

The trouble is supposed to have started at a dance Friday evening, when it is said that Henry Malley, a brother of the prisoner, made remarks about or to a mutual girl friend. It is alleged that Basil Malley, armed with a French bayonet, which he had brought home from overseas, set off for the home of George Bennett, where Henry was staying, with the avowed intention of killing his own brother.

Henry Malley was upstairs when Basil arrived at 11 o'clock and, jumping out of the upstairs window made getaway. Not to be outdone, Basil is said to have attacked George Bennett and, backing him in a corner, cut him with the bayonet. Mrs. Bennett and women neighbors, who were in the house at the time, rushed to the assistance of Bennett and succeeded in wrenching the weapon from Malley and hiding it under the house. Malley then left and came to Newcastle, returning again about 9 o'clock this morning when, it is said, he endeavored to locate the bayonet and threatened to kill the entire household.

Word was sent to Newcastle and Chief Hopkins, Officer Hill and Inspector Quartermaster went to Chatham Head and arrested Malley and brought him to Newcastle along with Bennett, who was taken to Dr. Bell, by whom his wounds were dressed, 14 stitches being required to close the cut in his neck.

Later Bennett laid an information of attempted murder against the prisoner. Malley, who was always of a very quiet nature, is about 32 years of age. He served overseas with the 122nd New Brunswick Battalion.

RECLUSE LEAVES

TEACHER \$150,000
New York, June 22.—Miss Elizabeth Worthman, who received a fortune of \$150,000 from the estate of an aged reclus who died last November in the public ward on Welfare Island, has resigned as teacher in Public School 8, West New York.

Miss Worthman plans to spend part of the \$150,000 which she has already received on a trip to Europe. Her only other extravagance has been the purchase of an imported roadster of a vermillion hue. She denies that romance has followed wealth and says she will not marry "for a long time."

The beneficiary was not related to Louis Lehman, who bequeathed her the fortune, and did not know him. He had been best man when her grandparents were married in Germany a half a century ago, and she has no relatives.

N. B. NEWSPAPER MAN IS DEAD

Fred H. Steeves of Hartland Died on Wednesday of Last Week

Hartland, N. B., June 20.—Fred H. Steeves, for many years managing director of the Hartland Observer, passed away suddenly at 10 o'clock last evening at his home in Hartland at the age of 62 years. The late Mr. Steeves was born in Somerville, N. B., a son of Henry M. Steeves. He entered upon his business career at the age of 16 and published the Hartland Observer, 1890-1901. He established the Carleton Observer in 1907 and continued as its editor and manager until the time of his death. He was a New Brunswick director of the Canadian Newspaper Association, a member of the K. of P. and an Anglican in religion. The late Mr. Steeves was very well known through the medium of his newspaper ventures and was highly esteemed in business as well as social life.

He is survived by one sister, Miss Marion Steeves and also one cousin. The funeral will be held Friday at his home in Hartland.

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MANITOBA CROPS BEHIND TIME

Uniformly Backward Says Second Report of Agricultural Dept.

Winnipeg, Man., June 21.—"Grain crops everywhere in Manitoba are uniformly backward, being ten days or two weeks behind the usual development at this time," says the second crop report issued by the Department of Agriculture. "Cool, dry weather the past six weeks seems generally to have produced good colored, slow-growing stand wheat, believed to be strongly rooted." Several correspondents remark upon the great prevalence of wild oats' seeds, apparently lying dormant in cold soil until after grain crops were sown, thus causing destruction by tillage given in sowing crops.

Many farmers planned to grow considerable acreage of corn this year, but so far this has been a poor corn season.

RECOVER TREASURE IN LOUGH SWILLY

Naval Divers Salvage Gold and Silver Sunk in Laurentic

London, June 21.—Practically the whole of the gold and silver sunk in the Laurentic in Lough Swilly during the war and amounting to six and a quarter millions pound sterling has been recovered from its bed off the Northern Irish Coast. The salvage section of the Royal Navy has ceased work on this job. The task was begun in 1918 but it was interrupted for twelve months. The action of the ocean currents broke up the vessel. Divers returning to their task found the vessel merely a jumble of old ironwork. The entire operation of salvaging the treasure has been carried through without a serious accident although one diver was forced to defend himself in a desperate fight with a huge conger eel.
