England, with the rest of Europe, had long been dependent upon the Spanish colonies of America for its currency of the precious metals, when it at length occurred to the fertile brain of Paterson that a joint stock company with adequate capital might issue their due-bills, payable on demand, which would serve the purposes of the gold itself. About this same time another Scottish adventurer, John Law, hurried forward to a similar fate, by their wild theories of paper money, to the collapse of their fortunes in the Darien and also the Mississippi schemes. But the banks of both England and France became in time, by careful management, highly serviceable institutions.

Subsequent to credit issues, however, a new phenomenon began to loom upon the
