Interests in Panama WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.-The Senate in secret session has passed the following bill to enable the President to protect the interests of the United States in Panama: Be it enacted, etc., That there be and is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of \$250,000 to enable the Fresident to protect the interests of the United States and to provide for the security of the persons and property of citizens of the United States at the Isthmus of Panama in such manner as he may deem expedient.
