

HOUSE OF LORDS—APRIL 13.
MUNICIPAL REFORM BILL.

The speech of Lord Lyndhurst affords a sufficient indication of the course which the Lords mean to take upon the *Irish Municipal Reform Bill*, which they have allowed to pass the second reading. They mean to oppose the resolution of Lord Francis Egerton, and, so doing, to bring the Irish Corporation altogether. While Scotland and England are thought capable of exercising the corporate privileges which have been preserved to them, Ireland is pronounced unworthy of enjoying the same distinction. An injudicious distinction, more humiliating than any which has been made since the adoption of the *Irish Municipal Reform Bill* has been established. In the authoritative terms of an act of parliament, the Irish people are to be informed that they are unfit co-tenants of the franchise in their municipal. — *Edinburgh Observer*, April 22.
