New Glasgow—The death occurred Thursday morning at eleven o'clock of James P. Roop, at his home, Washington street. Mr. Roop was in his eighty-second year, and had been ill for three weeks with heart trouble. The late Mr. Roop was born at Clementsport, where he carried on business for many years as a general merchant and lumberman. At one time he was also engaged in ship-building and was president of the Acadia Steamship Company.

Coming to New Glasgow some years ago Mr. Roop entered business and proved himself a public spirited citizen. He was County Councillor and later Warden of his native county for a considerable period. In 1906 he moved to New Glasgow where he and his family made a large number of friends. He was a faithful member of the Anglican church, St. George's. He is survived by his wife, Peggy I. Roop, in St. Louis, Mo.; by Frank B. Roop in West Virginia; Albert J. at home; Raymond, Mackay, of Worcester, Mass.; and Mrs. T. J. Marston, Halifax. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon with interment at Riverside cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. W. J. Harlow, of the First Baptist church.
