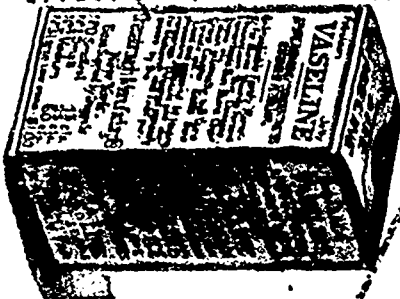

Scientific and Useful.

TOAST WATER.—When you have toasted until brown about half a slice of a quarter wheat loaf, pour over it in a jar or jug about a quart of water. Let it stand an hour and a half, and pour the water clear from the toast into a wine decanter. If a flavour be desired, it can be added, to the taste of the individual.

EGGS IN CASE OF TROUBLE.—The white of an egg is said to be a specific for fish bones sticking in the throat. It is swallowed raw and will carry down a bone easily and certainly. There is another fact touching eggs which it will be well to remember. When, as sometimes by accident, corrosive sublimate is swallowed, the white of one or two eggs taken will neutralize the poison, and change to that of a dose of calomel.

FRUIT CAKE.—One cup of butter, two cups of sugar, one cup of molasses, six cups of flour, with six rounding teaspoonfuls of Cook's Friend, mixed in one cup of sweet milk, three eggs, one pound of stoned raisins, one pound of currants, one-fourth pound of candied peel, two nutmegs, and other spices to taste. If sour milk is used, a teaspoonful of soda in the flour instead of the baking powder. This will make one large cake or two small ones.

COOKING BEETS.—One of the most satisfactory ways to cook beets is to bake them; when boiled, even if their jackets are left on, a great deal of the best part of the beet is dissolved and so lost. It will, of course, take a little longer to bake than to boil them, but this is no objection, allow from fifteen to twenty minutes more for baking; slice them and beat as you would if they were boiled. One nice way to serve them is to chop them fine. After they are cooked, season with pepper, salt, and butter.

SEA WATER IN DISEASE.—A writer says sea water acts as an alterative in such cases as are benefited by certain saline mineral waters; and, as its continued use increases the appetite, facilitates digestion, quickens nutritive changes, and augments the proportion of red corpuscles in the blood, he recommends it in the following cases: First, during convalescence from acute diseases; second, in the apyretic forms of dyspepsia; third, in nervous associated with impoverishment of the blood; fourth, in the scrofulous and tuberculous diathesis; and fifth, in diabetes.

GINGER PUDDING.—Pick and wash one quarter pound of Patna rice, and put it to boil with a pint of milk; when thoroughly done turn it out into a basin, take a 12.64 bottle of preserved ginger, drain off the syrup, mince the ginger quite fine, add it to the rice, and work it well with a spoon for some time; beat up half a gill of cream with the yolks of six and the whites of three eggs; strain this into the mixture, and keep on stirring it for some time longer, then pour it into a buttered mould, steam it for one hour and a half, strain the ginger syrup, warm it, and pour it on the dish on which the pudding is turned out.

TO MAKE GOOD GRAVY.—After repeated failures I determined at all hazards to solve the serious problem. I had a roast of beef in the dripping-pan; it was ready to take up on the platter; in the pan was, I knew, good material for gravy, and after taking up the meat I poured off, with the exception of about three tablespoonfuls, out into a basin; I then put a little cold water into the pan, then added half a cup of milk, into which I had beaten two tablespoonfuls of flour, then set the pan on the stove, stirring the gravy every moment, and presently had the satisfaction of seeing a rich, brown, well-made gravy ready for the table. No matter how faithfully you try, you cannot succeed if you put your milk and flour into the hot grease; it will be lumpy, and will separate.
