

A FAMOUS REFORMER.

REV. C. J. FREEMAN SPEAKS OF HIS LIFE AND WORK.

He Has Written and Preached on Both Sides of the Atlantic—Recently the Victim of a Peculiar Affliction From Which He Was Released in a Marvellous Manner.

No. 157 Emerson Street, South Boston, is the present home of Rev. C. J. Freeman, B. A., Ph. D., the recent rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, at Anacosta, Mont.
