UNEMPLOYMENT INCREASE—TRAINING AND RETRAINING OF YOUNG PEOPLE-PAYMENT OF ALLOWANCES

Mr. David Lewis (York South): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a supplementary question to the Minister of Manpower and Immigration arising out of the questions on unemployment. In view of the fact that by far the largest group of the unemployed are very young people between the ages of 14 and 19, would the minister inform the House how soon we may expect the changes in the law and regulations affecting training and retraining and the payment of allowances to those persons obtaining retraining so as to remove the three-year waiting period for allowances and the other obstacles to the training and retraining of young people?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, I shall not enter into a dispute about the statistics of my hon. friend, although I draw a slightly different interpretation from the unemployment figures than he does. I would say, however, in respect of his question that, as he knows, it is a most fundamental question relating to the distribution of available funds among the work force capable of taking training. At present consultations and research are being carried on with the provinces. We expect advice from the National Advisory Council on Manpower and Immigration. If any change is indicated, we do not feel it would be wise to make a fundamental change until we have had the best possible advice from these two sources. In other words, I do not expect a decision at an early date.

Mr. Lewis: In view of the fact that, if my memory serves me right, some weeks ago the minister indicated that changes in the rules along this line were being contemplated, does the minister's answer now mean that such changes are not being contemplated but that he is waiting for some advice from somebody?
