## QUALIFICATION OF CBC STAFF

## Question No. 548—Mr. Towers:

1. What is the status or category of the position of the person or persons who decide (a) the types of programs to be produced (b) the actual content (c) the cost of each program of CBC?

2. Who edits the daily CBC news reports?

3. What are the required qualifications to fill each position referred to above?

4. During the past two years (a) how many new employees have been taken on staff by CBC at headquarters (b) how many of CBC headquarters' staff (i) resigned (ii) were requested to leave (iii) were transferred (c) what are the names and qualifications of CBC staff hired?

Hon. James Hugh Faulkner (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows: 1. (a) Program directors, national and local; (b) Area heads and producers; (c) Those named in (a) and (b) working in concert.

2. News editors under the direction of news supervisors.

3. Producers must have demonstrable capacity in program conception, production (including budget control) and direction. Area heads and program directors would normally be expected to have considerable program production and administrative experience to allow them to carry out the supervisory functions stated in question one. The prime requirement for news editors is university graduation or equivalent in experience, plus a minimum of three years in the journalistic field. This latter could be acquired in newspapers, news agencies such as *Canadian Press* or in private radio or television. For news supervisors the same qualifications apply except that minimum journalistic experience is usually ten years.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (President of Privy Council): I am informed by the Royal Canadian Mint and the Bank of Canada as follows: 1. (a): .25 Silver, \$132,276,462.25; .25 Nickel, \$67,532,406.50; .10 Silver, \$77,700,289.10; .10 Nickel, \$27,224,802.50; .05 Silver, \$4,470,061.65; .05 Nickel, \$37,964,802.00; .05 Steel, \$3,443,020.10; .05 Tombac, \$548,973.25; .01 Bronze, \$49,297,188.83; (b) As of January 1, 1972, value of bank notes in circulation was \$4,103,422,885.
