A difference of opini-" on with regard to measures to be taken against Spain, of the " highest importance to the honour of the crown, and to the "most essential national interests, (and this founded on what " Sp in had already done, not on what that Court may farther " intend to do) was the cause of my resigning the Seals. Lord "Temple, and I submitted in writing, and signed by us, our " most humble sentiments to his Majesty, which being over " ruled by the united opinion of all the rest of the King's Ser-"vants, I refigned the seals on Monday the 5th of this month,
