Climate

The Hotel

THE ABENAKIS HOTEL is a commodious building erected with special reference to health and comfort. It is two-and-a-half stories high, one hundred and twenty five feet in length by one hundred in depth, with a central tower four stories high. Adjoining the hotel proper is an extension one hundred and twenty-five feet long. There are nearly one hundred large, well-aired and easily accessible bedrooms, with a spacious dining-room, parlors and baths, arranged with special reference to personal comfort, social enjoyment and recreation. It is the constant aim of the management to make the guests feel "at home."

Lakes and Rivers

The St. Francis River flows on past the Hotel to the St. Lawrence. Its clear, blue waters, dotted with innumerable islands, present a most charming view and ever-changing panorama.

Lake St. Peter is formed by the union of the St. Francis, Yamaska, Richelieu, Nicolet and St. Lawrence rivers. It is twelve miles wide and thirty long.
