

The French War Office communique of this afternoon says: "On our left wing the front is becoming more and more ex-tended. Some very important masses of German cavalry have been observed in the vicinity of Lille, advancing before forces of the enemy, which are moving thru the region to the north of a line between Tourcoing and Armentieres. "Around Armes and on the right bank of the Somme the situa-tion is practically unchanged. Between the Somme and the Oise there have been alternate advances and withdrawals. "Near Lassigny the enemy tried an important attack, which failed. On the right bank of the Aisne to the north of Soissons we have advanced slightly with the co-operation of the British army. We have also made some progress in the region of Berry-au-Bac. "There is nothing to report concerning the remainder of the front. The Belgian forces defending Antwerp have solidly established themselves on the Rupel-Nethe line, against which the German attacks have failed."


#### ANTWERP'S BOMBARDMENT IMMINENT.

A despatch to the Exchange Felegraph from Antwerp gives the following official communication issued at 10 o'clock last (Tuesday) night:


