To-day we received further word from the International Red Cross that Captain Hall had been reported officially by the German Red Cross as a prisoner. We do not yet know his prisoner camp address.

One coincidence in connection with his latest letter lays grim emphasis on the swift vicissitudes of war. Major Raoul Lufbery was attached to the pursuit group to which Captain Hall had been sent, and the latter writes at length about some work that they were planning to do together. But when the letter reached Boston, its writer had been nearly two weeks a prisoner in Germany, and Major Lufbery only the day before had given up his life in a daring air fight in France.
