## Grain Prices Slightly Firmer But Trading is Decidedly Dull Dewnward Movement in Prices

Wheat Closed Fractionally. Higher at Chicago After an Early Decline Foreign Markets Are All Lower.

gained 1-8c to 1-4c and oats 1-8c to 1-8c. In provisions there was 2 1-2c to 20c decline.

According to figures made public to-day only 1,298,000 bushels were added to the world's supply of wheat during the last week, altho the gain at the corresponding time a year ago was 9. Il.000 bushels. Instead of being as heretofore, this season greatly in excess of the totals for twelve months back, the world's stock is now but little more. Besides this shock for the bears, there were other aids to the market in the shape of frost damage reports from Canada. It was also apparent that selling early had been overdone. Weak cables and heavy Northwestern receipts were the chief depressing influences at the outset. Unloading of holdings by local leaders was on a decidedly liberal scale far a while, one operator alone selling out nearly 1,000,000 hushels. The property, however, was well taken, and did not at any time thereafter come back into the pit. During the session December ranged between '95 7-3c and '96 7-3c, closing firm, 1-4c up at 36 3-4c to 96%c.

Corn was well supported. One reason was that clearances were larger than has been the case of late. Closing strength in wheat had also considerable effect. December fluctuated between 63 7-8c to 64 1-4c, and in the end was firm, 1-8c to 1-4c net higher, at 64 1-4c. Cash grades were dull.

A fair cash demand rallied oats before the advance in wheat and corn was fully developed. High and low levels touched by the December option were 46c to 46 1-2c and 45 5-8c, with the close at the top figures named, a rise of 1-8c to 1-4c over last night.

The provisions market was under pressure from longs, who had made purchases at recent high figures. When the last song sounded pork showed 2 1-2c to 20c fall, and there was 2 1-2c to 7 1-2c cut from the cost of the other kinds of product.
