WHITNEY INCONSISTENT SAYS MCKENZIE KING

Liberals Had Quite a Rousing Rally at Hamilton—No Deal With Labor Party.

HAMILTON, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The Whitney government's attitude towards bilingualism and education in general, assessment reform, workingmen's compensation, agriculture and colonization, the public domain and the administration of justice, was arraigned in vigorous terms by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, before a large audience in Association Hall last night.

Mr. King first criticized the government's action in bringing on the provincial elections at this time. "The real reason," declared Mr. King, "was that Sir James thought he could steal a march. He thought that the recent wave of popular opinion which swept the Conservative party into power in the Dominion Government would be an advantage to him at the present time, and that it would divert criticism from the acts of the provincial government. Such an attitude is a confession of weakness on the part of Sir James and his government."

Mr. King found fault with Sir James for not making a definite pronouncement on bilingual schools. An eminent churchman had charged more than a year ago that such schools were being conducted in the province and Sir James had appointed Dr. Merchant to investigate. The fact that a year had passed without any report indicated that conditions were serious. Dr. Reume and Hon. Mr. Foy had contradicted each other in the matter. Sir James had said that the government's policy was decided when Dr. Merchant made his report. The following night he had said that there was nothing in the question. The following night he had said that the question was a legacy from the Hoes government.

Wasted Seven Years. "If that is so," said Mr. King, "then the Whitney government in the past seven years had failed to perform its duty, and that statement is a confession that the educational affairs of the province have not been properly administered." You can take Sir James' answers," suggested the speaker, "and ask yourself if the provincial government has any right to expect your confidence until it has taken a definite stand on this question."

Shortage of teachers in the province was another matter in which the government was to blame, whatever the reason for such shortage might be. Temporary permits to teach had been issued to 1145 teachers, who did not hold certificates. "The government's first duty was to get duly qualified teachers. 'The time has come,'" declared Mr. King, "when the province should have a new minister of education or a new government."

Make Taxation Issue. Sir James Whitney, said Mr. King, had taken an arbitrary stand on the question of amending the Assessment Act, and had ignored the petition from 250 municipalities for a change in the law. This attitude showed that not the Conservative party, but Sir James and two or three friends in his cabinet governing the province. Industry should not be taxed to the same extent as indolence, said the speaker, and he advised the Liberal candidate in West Hamilton, to make his campaign on this issue, and to make The Spectator support him, as it was opposed to Sir James in the matter.

inured in industry, was another question which Mr. King alleged that Sir James had taken refuge behind some one else. In this case Chief Justice Meredith had been appointed to investigate the matter and in his report made the government refused to formulate a policy. Yet every year 2,000 men were being killed outright in the ranks of industrial labor and four or five times that number were injured so as to seriously impair their usefulness and earning power.

FR. VAUGHAN MORALIZES ON STORY OF MAGDALEN

Preaches Sermon Significant of Advent Season at Lady of Lourdes Church.

Rev. Fr. Bernard Vaughan of London, England, who has been termed the modern Chavoncola because he inveighed against the false, foolish and foolish of the London court set with as much vehemence and courage as did the redoubtable figure of Florence condemn the vices of the people in the time of the Renaissance, gave the first sermon of his Advent series at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church, St. Nicholas and East-street, last night. Rev. Fr. Vaughan arrived in Toronto Saturday at the invitation of Rev. Fr. Canaling of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, and will remain here until Christmas, giving a sermon each Sunday evening at Our Lady of Lourdes Church.

Every seat of the church last night was taken. His theme was "Magdalen, Sinner, Penitent and Saint." Fr. Vaughan said he was glad to give four per cent. taken from the gospel story, and from each of these portions all would find a lesson taught, appropriate to the Advent season.

Beaten by Reciprocity. In the course of his remarks Mr. King took exception to the charge that Sir James had made against him in the Dominion House, that he attempted to stir up racial feeling in his own constituency of Waterloo in the recent Dominion election and that he had been defeated on that account. Reciprocity was the only thing that has beaten him, said Mr. King, and the only reference he has ever made to racial question was in quoting word used by Mr. Borden, himself, and his remarks had been directly misinterpreted. He strongly disapproved of the coalition government which the Dominion premier had formed, and expressed his opinion that Mr. Borden should come out and say exactly where he stands on the naval question.

"I am prepared to start out on the morning of Dec. 12," declared Mr. King, "and stump Canada from ocean to ocean in the necessary of doing something for the mother country in the matter of naval defence. Will Mr. Borden do the same?"

Some rather startling statements were made by W. Madison Hicks of Brantford, who spoke briefly before Mr. King took the platform. Mr. Hicks announced himself as the president of the Independent Labor League of Ontario, which, said he, was but the Australian Government in action in this country. He said he appeared in his official capacity as president of the league, which was against the Conservatives in Hamilton because he had "caught them in so much dirt." He denounced Col. Hicks' unimpaired terms, and had been alleged attacks on the independent labor movement, and said, "It is grafters like he—tell him that W. Madison Hicks is a scoundrel, and that he should apologize to the laborer who he has done like such movements."

Had Detectives Working. Hicks said that he had been told that Allan Studholme, M.A., had been a member of a frame up between the Labor party and the Liberals, and that he had been sent up here by the Conservatives in Toronto to check Studholme. Certain information was to have been furnished him by the local police, he said, but it had not been forthcoming. He had had to do the work in the matter, he stated, but had been unable to find any truth in the charge against Studholme. He, therefore, had washed his hands of the matter, and advised his hearers to vote against both Conservative candidates. John Lennox was chairman of the meeting.

Smothered in Bed.

Rob McCullough, 60 years of age, who lived at 49 North Hughson-st., was discovered dead in his bed, this morning. Coroner White found that McCullough had gone to bed in an intoxicated condition, and that he had smothered to death by lying on his face. No inquest will be held.

Germany's Aerial Cruiser.

COLOGNE, Germany, Dec. 3.—(Can. Press.)—The military authorities are planning to build an aerial cruiser, with a carrying power of 300 persons and a speed of 10 miles an hour. Its gas capacity will be 10,000 cubic metres. The plan is the outcome of the aerial manoeuvres just ended, which were unusually satisfactory.

BERLIN RAILWAY EXTENSION.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The board of health have granted permission to build an abattoir to Dumart Bros., wholesale butchers of this city. The customs returns for Berlin show a substantial increase for the month of November. The figures are \$25,826.68, an increase of \$5,729.12. The vital statistics filed during November are: Births 56, marriages 19, and deaths 15. Hon. Adam Beck will speak here tomorrow in the interests of Dr. Lackner, the Conservative candidate. Other outside speakers are expected before the campaign closes.

Application is being made by the Berlin and Brantford Street Railway Co. to change its name to the Berlin and Northern Railway, and to increase its stock to \$400,000. The object of the railway is to extend its line northward to Elora and Fergus. A movement is on foot by the ratepayers of the Village of Bridgeport to petition the City of Berlin to annex that village. Such a course would increase Berlin's population 500, giving a total of 16,000.

At the inquest into the death of Harry Shaver, who was killed by the Grand Trunk train at Cainsville, on Thursday, when his horse ran away, which was held here Saturday evening, a verdict was made that the driver was returned and the crew of the train was exonerated. It was recommended, however, by the jury that the company should improve leading facilities where Shaver met his death.

FATHER VAUGHAN

Eminent priest of London, Eng., now visiting Toronto.

Before opening his sermon, he read the story of Magdalen, "the woman who was in the city a sinner," said Fr. Vaughan, "Magdalen was called, according to tradition, from her home in Bethany and married one Boppus, who soon deserted her. She then fell into the hands of a sinner, and the word he used for her was 'profligate,' and the beautiful setting of her conversion at the feet of the Saviour is now radiant, so that she is now called 'the woman who was in the city a sinner.' He asked that Magdalen's conversion be taken as an exhortation, an inspiration, 'The evil of to-day, the despair of the future, the hope of the future, is quite fashionable for people to hug their sins, saying: 'We will not part with them, they are integral with our nature.'"

Next Sunday at Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Rev. Fr. Vaughan will deal with the model penitent for young men, "The Prodigal."
