All observers agree that German cities are administered with exceptional ability and no small part of the credit for this is given to the fact that their mayors have either been specially trained, or in some exceptional cases men of mark in other departments of the national service. BROOKLYN, N. Y. June 2.-Pastor Russell addressed a large audience again in the Academy of Music. His topic was, "The Fall of Mystic Babylon." His text; " Mene, Mene, Tekel, Upharsin-weighed in the balance and found wanting." (Daniel v., 25, 27.) In brief he said:

While our message for to-day is "meat in due season" to the household of faith, and every way most important to be understood, it is, nevertheless a subject difficult to treat without giving offence, without being misunderstood, without seeming harsh. 


