

REFORM

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutes.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within ul miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, selely owned and occupled by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Bylaw to Provide for the Establish ment of a Public Library in the Vil lage of Mimica.

WHEREAS thirty electors have petitioned the council of the said Village of Mimico praying for the establishment of a Public Library under "The Public Libraries Act."

Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Mimico enacts as follows:

1. That in case the assent of the electors is given to this bylaw, a public library be established in this municipality in accordance with the provisions of "The Public Libraries Act."

2. That the votes of the electors shall be taken on this bylaw on Monday, the 6th day of January, 1913, being the day of the annual election for the municipal council, and the polis shall be held at the same hour on the same day, at the same place or places, and by the same deputy returning officers as for the said municipal election.

3. That on the 4th day of January, 1913, at the Public School on Church street, in the said Village of Mimico, at 12 o'clock noon, the reeve will attend to appoint in writing, signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk, and one person to attend at each poling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this bylaw, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this bylaw, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this bylaw. 4. The clerk shall attend at the said Public School, Mimico, at the hour of 12 o'clock noon, on the 5th day of January, 1913, to sum up the number of votes respectively for and against the said by-law
