

JEWELRY STOLEN FROM A WINDOW

Bold Thief Broke Plate Glass in Grossman's Store and Obtained Valuable Articles.

Constant Thompson Deserves Credit For Clever Capture of Charles Calladine Alias Frank Williams.

After hurling a flat thru the window of Grossman's jewelry store, 314-1/2 Yonge street, about 6 o'clock yesterday morning, a bold robber attempted to climb the show window of valuables and would have succeeded had it not been for the prompt action of Constable Thompson.

The officer was patrolling his beat with Patrol Sergeant Brown, when he noticed Constable MacDonnell signaling him from a Yonge street car.

While he was trying to interpret the sign, Herbert Saunders, 49 Hayes street, rushed up and explained that a man was robbing a store farther down the street.

The two officers ran to the scene and saw a man speed up Albert street. They pursued along Teraraul street and then west along Queen street.

Other officers were by this time in the vicinity, but the man had disappeared. Constable Thompson picked up a late of the National Sanitarium Association, alias Frank Williams, about \$800 worth of jewelry was found in his possession.

PLANS FOR WORKS MUST BE PASSED

Ontario Railway Board Must Give Sanction to Waterworks and Extension Plans Before Third Reading.

In drawing up the Scarborough waterworks extension bylaw and the island filtration plant bylaw, providing for expenditures of \$6,677,000, and \$1,375,000, the city council either ignored or neglected to comply with the provisions of the Public Health Act, which calls for provincial ratification of all plans in connection with both works.

Some doubt has now been expressed as to the legality of submitting the bylaw, but the reading of the act apparently makes it plain that the official sanction does not have to be received until the bylaw is about to pass its third reading.

Boston's Civic Christmas Tree.

BOSTON, Dec. 24.—(Can. Press).—A giant Christmas tree, all ablaze with red and blue lights, cast its glow over Boston Common and to the neighboring busy streets tonight.

It was the city's first municipal Christmas tree, an unusual program of music and song attracted thousands to the common despite the deep snow and the cold blasts of a north-easterly wind.

The celebration was continued until midnight. Choirs boys of the Church of the Advent, the Church of the Messiah, in accordance with their usual custom, sang carols to the door in Beacon Hill, singing Christmas carols.

MUNSEY AND HOCKIN BRANDED AS GUILTY

State Attorney Challenges Defense to Show Innocence of Two Men—Offer Not Taken.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 24.—(Canadian Press).—Standing before the jury at the trial of the forty accused "bomb plotters," U. S. District Attorney Charles F. Miller today charged any of the defense's 12 lawyers to speak in behalf of J. E. Munsey of Salt Lake City, or Herbert S. Hockin, former secretary of the nonworkers' union.

Munsey was accused of harboring James B. McNamara in the latter's flight from Los Angeles after blowing up the Times building there, and was branded by the district attorney as "one of the men who thought now to be in San Quentin prison for murdering the innocent."

Hockin was declared to be "the lingo of the conspiracy who started the dynamiting and then snatched on the others to promote his own ambition."

The dramatic scene ensued soon after U. S. Senator John W. Kern had ended his argument for the defense. Mr. Miller reflected the growing list of subscriptions to the King Edward Memorial Fund for Consumptives.

STATE SENATOR GETS THREE YEARS IN JAIL

George Catone of Dayton, Ohio, Found Guilty of Accepting a Two Hundred Dollar Bribe.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 24.—(Can. Press).—Three years in the penitentiary was the sentence passed upon State Senator George K. Catone of Dayton, by Judge Evans, in Common Pleas Court today.

Senator Catone was convicted recently of having accepted a bribe of \$200 during the last session of the legislature. His attorneys will probably appeal the case.

Ottawa Citizen Proprietor Says Sir James Must Concede Point or Resign Party Leadership.

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.—(Can. Press).—W. M. Southam, proprietor of the Ottawa Citizen, asked if he had any reply to the attack made by Sir James Whitney yesterday, gave the following Point or Resign Party Leadership.

"In regard to the Citizen's editorial on Whitney, the big boss, wherein it is pointed out to the conservative party that it was necessary in the public interest, as well as in the party's interest, that there should be a change of policy towards the reform, or a change of provincial leadership, we simply viewed, as a conservative newspaper, what we believed to be the best course to be followed by Sir James Whitney's management of this question. The Citizen's editorial was not intended to elaborate the idea, and endeavor to make it so plain to all that action along one line or the other will have to be taken."

FOUND PRAYER MAT OF 'CHINESE' GORDON

Interesting Relic of Hero of Khartoum Placed in Memorial Chapel—Adopted Moslem Custom.

KHARTOUM, Dec. 24.—(Can. Press).—One of the most interesting relics of "Chinese" Gordon, the hero of Khartoum, in the shape of his "prayer mat," which he used while governor of Sudan from 1875 to 1878, has just been recovered and brought back to this city. It was given to Bishop Wynne by one of Gen. Charles J. Gordon's sons and has now been placed in the Gordon Memorial Chapel in the cathedral here as a "keener" in the sanctuary.

It is a piece of woolen needlework, about a yard long and 18 inches wide and is exactly similar to the prayer mats carried by devout Moslems. Gordon adopted this habit when he was in the Sudan, where the floors of the houses are almost without exception formed of baked mud or rough stone.

Bishop Wynne considered it highly appropriate to place Gen. Gordon's prayer mat in the Gordon Chapel in the cathedral here as a "keener" in the sanctuary.

PRIMITIVE MODE OF LIFE IN EGYPT

Families Often Sleep Amid Rubbish on Roofs of Reed Dwellings.

Egyptian village life is quaint and interesting. The houses are crude, constructed of sun-baked mud, with possibly a couple of tiny square holes cut in the walls for ventilation. Each house consists of a single room, absolutely devoid of furniture, one or two drinking cups and cooking utensils being used on the only articles to be seen. The roofs of these hovels are thatched with corn or wheat, and into these thatched roofs the household rubbish is dumped.

For this purpose a ladder is used for climbing up. From a distance a village is apt to look like an immense rubbish heap. These reed dwellings are inhabited solely by the fellahs, an Egyptian peasant is called. From early dawn till late evening the men are working in the fields, while the women folk spend most of the day squatting on the roofs of their dwellings, and often the entire family sleep in them at night.

PLOT TO KILL KING VICTOR.

ROME, Dec. 24.—(Can. Press).—The examination of Henry Dalfero, a "young anarchist" who recently attempted to commit suicide rather than carry out a mission imposed on him by the anarchists to assassinate King Victor Emmanuel, was held today. It revealed the existence of a deep laid plot to kill the king. Five other anarchists have been arrested for alleged connection in the plot.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is desired, and satisfy any agency or certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or by any other person.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader who has not been in possession of the land for a term of at least 90 days, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in possession may present a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years. A homesteader who has not been in possession of the land for a term of at least 90 days, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right for a purchase of a homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre.
