VALUE OF TORONTO'S HARBOR HIGH TIME IT WAS REALIZED

Noel Marshall Gives Pointer at Yesterday's Session of Waterway Commission-Lake in Danger.

The question of damming Lake Erie vas discussed yesterday at the openng session of the international waterways commission at the city hall. An array of Toronto civic authorities and ousiness men were on hand to defend he interests of this city in view of the hreatened lowering of the water in Lake Ontario if the scheme were car ried out, and the resulting ruinous effect upon Toronto harbor.

The chairman of the Canadian comis J. P. Mabee, K.C., and Col. O. H. Ernst of Washington, D.C., presides over the American section. The American commissioners present yesterday were George Clinton and Louis C. Sabin of Buffalo. S. Y. Wismer of Detroit was absent on account of iliness. The Canadian interests were represented by Louis F. Coste, Dr. W. F. King and Thomas Cote of Ottawa, the
