dollars each to have a variation made in the terms, and to ship via Portland. The work on cattle steamers is, in fact, very hard, and the pay actu-ally inserted in the contracts was only a shilling per month, while no pro-visions were made for the return of the men to America.

The secretary is the most pow-erful member of the governing aler-archy. No resolution of the association can be in force unless it were voted for by three-fourths of the total members. The members bind themselves to be responsible for the acts, defaults and breaches of the agreement by their agents, travelers and employee, and to obey any resolution adopted by the as-sociation.
