Carpenters Strike To-Day To Quit Work at 5 o'Clock

More Than Two. Thirds Majority Voted to Stop Work-Teaching a Lesson to the Builders After

The carpenters are on strike. On many streets in Toronto building operations are in progress, and on all houses in course of erection from three to five carpenters are employed, and in some cases several more, and all these men will go out. The rush of recent arrivals from the old land includes many carpenters, but they are mostly in sym pathy with the union men, and if they are not they have to contend with the union feelings of the other classes of skilled labor employed upon the work, so it means a nasty mess unless a settlement can be reached soon. The returns from the city architect's office show an enormous increase in building activity in the city, and the carpenters strike is quite liable to go much fur-

This Year's 'Permits. So far close on \$8,000,000 worth of building permits have been issued in Toronto this year. This exceeds last year's issue at this time by about a million and a half dollars. This being the weather suitable to quick building.
