**MONTREAL BASEBALL CLUB.**  
Lost \$20,000 and is Now for Sale—  
—Want Dooley Back.

**MONTREAL, Oct. 24.**—The Montreal baseball franchise is for sale.

It is stated that the people who backed it this year have lost about \$25,000, notwithstanding the immense amount of free advertising they have secured.

Mr. Farrell, the baseball magnate and horseman, who has had the lion's share of interest in the club, and Clark Griffith, who is greatly interested, and whose brother-in-law is groundskeeper, would sell the club for any money back, and are prepared to sell at a small sum.

Therefore, the chances that there will be or will not be an Eastern League baseball team in Montreal are about even.

It is stated that the Montreal Street Railway will be approached to take the franchise of Messrs. Farrell and Griffith's hands.

It is also stated that a local syndicate of some kind once owned the club and placed Dooley back in the position of manager, after having been for some years in the United States customs service. He has gone back to baseball and has made quite a sum of money.

Many of his friends would like to see him back here.

If such a local syndicate was formed, the Montrealers would probably be drawn to a well known baseball and Rugby football enthusiast and business man.

The franchise of the Montreal club may have an inexpensive term next year.

**Methodist Board Want Sociology Emphasized at Universities.**

The general annual meeting of the Board of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church took

place yesterday. Rev. Joseph Henderson of the mission room was appointed to the board.

It was decided to request the authorities of the university and the various colleges connected with the Methodist Church to give more definite and scientific instructions regarding sociology.

The board adhered to their former position, requesting the government to introduce legislation repealing the three-fifths vote requirement for the local option bylaws, and commended the vigilance of the government in enforcing the liquor laws.

A committee was appointed to confer with the moral reform committee of the Presbyterian Church.

**BROKE EASTWARD RECORD.**

Lusitania Sets Another Four Day Figure.

QUEENSTOWN, Oct. 24.—The Cunard liner Lusitania, on her way to New York, broke the eastward record for the route, making the passage in four days and four hours.
