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A TORONTO RACING PROJECT
New Track to be Built Next Summer, According to Information From Detroit.

A Detroit evening paper contained the following piece of turf information, which is given for what it is worth:

An important meeting of the interested ones will be held in this city Saturday for the purpose of determining the future of the northern racing circuit. The meeting was doubtless called as the result of a well-founded rumor to the effect that a syndicate of wealthy Canadians is seriously considering the advisability of building a new track in Toronto.

According to the information received, the Canadians will have several meetings during the summer if they build a track, and it is racing in general on them the greater part of the season. It will greatly interfere with the Farmer-Heindrick circuit. Those who are expected in this city to-morrow to consider the question which confronts the managers of the northern circuit are: W. O. Palmer, George M. Hendrie and E. K. Dodds, representing the Bel-Air Jockey Club of Montreal, and the members of the Highland Park Club Association.

If the Toronto project goes through, about the only way to prevent disastrous results will be to admit them to the existing circuit, and divide dates in the most advantageous manner possible.

The other match was between Varsity and the Wellingtons, the former winning handily. This was the Wellingtons' debut in the senior ranks, and although they were beaten they made a good try at it.

Last night's game between T.R.C. and Waterloo at the Victoria rink was probably the fastest ever played in this city. It certainly was the roughest. Referee Gossy did all possible to check and play, but on every available opportunity the players on both sides indulged in the most deliberate foul tactics. Macdonald being twice sent off for cross-checking.

Work of both teams was poor, with the exception of the latter part of the first half, when the T.R.C. forwards developed a splendid combination, which the Germans were unable to stop.
