Mr. Lewis Dowd of Montreal Acquitted of the Charge of Gaming in Stocks.

JUST WORKED ON COMMISSION.

Judge Choquette Disposed of a Case of Importance to All Financial Men.

Montreal, March 30.-(Special.)-Mr. Lewis Dowd, charged in September last with gaming in stocks and subsequently committed to stand his trial for aiding and abetting, was acquitted to-day by Judge Choquette in the Court of Special Sessions. His Honor dismissed the case on the ground that Mr. Dowd was a broker pure and simple, working on commission; that he was uninterested in the rise and fall of the stocks purchased or sold, as he forwarded all orders to his correspondents in New York, to be filled by them. Further more, the court said that there was nothing to show that these orders were not bona fide sales, and, even if they had not been filled, Judge Choquette held that there was nothing to show any guilty knowledge on the part of Mr. Dowd, who had evidently acted honestly and in good faith throughout. As to any question of charging interest, the statements produced in the case showed that interest at six per cent. was to be charged. Messrs. Rielle and Bond, and Air. J. L. Jewish Colonial Trust Has Opened

That Extradition Case.

The Court of Appeal heard argument in the Lazier extradition case yesterday. Marcus Lazier was accused by William Warren, J. S. Smith & Son, H. T. Achre and P. A. Pratt, all of the United States, of forgery and obtaining money under false pretences. Lazier was arrested at Belleville and ordered to be extradited on four charges of forgery, and four of false pretences, by the Judge of the Common Pleas. An appeal was made to Sir William Meredith, who set aside the false pretences, but allowed the four forgery charges to stand. Mr. P. G. Smyth is appealing and asking for the discharge of the prisoner on the ground that nothing in the evidence proves forgery, and that the United States has not asked for his extradition.
