THE MAN WHOSE OVERBEARING OBSTINACY CAUSED THE DOWNFALL OF HIMSELF AND RUIN TO HIS COUNTRY LANDS IN EUROPE.

Great Crowds Cheered Him at Marseilles, and He Made a Speech Telling of the War—Michael Davitt Was on Hand and Gave an Address.

Marseilles, Nov. 22.—Ex-President Kruger of the Transvaal landed here at 10.45 this morning from the steamer Gelderland.

Weather Was Beautiful. The weather was beautiful and the Boer leader received a magnificent demonstration.

Just What He Said. He said: "I thank the President of the Marseilles Committee and the President of the Central Committee of the Independence of the Boers for their welcome."

Who Declared War? "I believe England, had she been better informed, never have consented to this war, and since the expedition of Jameson, who wished to see the two Republics without the necessity of firing a rifle shot, I have never ceased to demand a formal apology which up to now has always been refused."

Confidence in God. "Our great imperishable confidence rests in the eternal God. We know our cause is just, and if the justice of our cause is wanting to us, He, the Eternal, who is Master of all peoples, and to whom we have never abandoned our faith, will surely give us the victory."

Sympathetic Frenchmen. Mr. Kruger cannot be elated at the warmth of his reception by the people of Marseilles today. From the moment the white, twelve-wheeled cargo train of the Gelderland with ex-President Kruger sitting in her stern, surrounded by his Boer representatives, the storm of cheering never ceased until he entered the Hotel Bristol.

Boer the Yearning Well. Mr. Kruger bore the sea voyage extremely well. He said he had never felt better health than before he left Pretoria.
