Hamilton, Nov. 24 .- All is quiet here this morning in connection with the strike. The regulars from Toronto and London are ready for anything which may happen, but if any disturbance occurs it likely will not be until after dark. The dynamite explosion at the east-end car barns early this morning did not do much damage beyond wrecking a portion of the building. No-
