"Any returned man who finds that his injuries have disabled him for the work in which he was previously engaged can obtain training in any line of work for which he is adapted by application either to Principal Beal at the Technical School, or to the authorities at the Military Convalescent Hospital," was the statement made today by W. W. Nichol, vocation officer for returned soldiers for Ontario, just previous to leaving for Toronto after a few days spent in the city for the inspection of the vocational training being done here. Further in regard to the training of men for occupations whereby to earn a livelihood, he pations whereby to earn a livelihood said: "While in the city I have bee amining men so disabled they cannot go back to their old jobs. In such cases, we hold a board to arrange for courses of instruction to be given these men to fit them for careers. During their term of instruction, they will receive ample pay and adequate provision will be made for their families. I regard this as the most important phase of work for the returned sodiers."




