AMERICANS STORM GERMAN TRENCHES BEFORE CANTIGNY

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The morning American troops stormed German trenches and machine gun nests in front of Cantigny, in the Montdidier sector. Those of the German garrison who remained to fight and to carry out their orders to defend the positions at any cost were killed by rifle and machine gun fire or bayonets. The Americans also took some prisoners.

WESTERN ONTARIO BRIEFS

Blenheim is facing an action for damages caused to the car of Isaac Smith of Ridgeway, by a rope stretched across a street which was being laid.

Blenheim school teachers are asking an increase in salary. Miss McKenney, principal of the continuation school, has been granted \$100. Other cases are being considered.

The scarcity of help is causing much anxiety to the sugar beet growers in the vicinity of Seaforth this year. The crop is promising if it can be properly taken care of.

Ruthven reports splendid growth of all crops. Early potatoes and tomatoes are especially promising. Strawberries are practically done. A good rain would be welcome to the farmers of this district.

The financial statement of the West End board of agriculture presented at the annual meeting in St. Thomas was encouraging to the directors.

Hugh McPhail was elected president for the ensuing year.

Dominion Day will be fittingly celebrated in St. Thomas under the auspices of the O. D. and the board of trade. Exhibition flights by an aviator from Beamsville have been arranged.

Seriously burned while rescuing a lad whose clothes had accidentally caught on fire, little hope is held out for the recovery of George Allison, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Allison of South Harwich.

Awaiting instructions from Ottawa, Magistrate Maxwell of St. Thomas, is detaining several aliens who were arrested and had no passports. He is also undecided as to sending the men who are arrested for evasion of the military headquarters to decide their status.

Sarnia citizens are objecting to the site chosen for an incinerator. They say another situation would be less expensive to the city. It is further stated that the only site approved by the provincial health representative is the one refused by the council.

The city council of Sarnia was urged by Lieut.-Col. Mackendziel to discontinue the use of water on the streets, as it was the cause of the disintegration of the road. Oil was recommended as being more satisfactory and cheaper.

The action of the military police on their visit to the Jesuit novitiate at Guelph, is causing a flurry of excitement in the ministerial alliance there. A public meeting of protest in connection with the action may be held next week. The minister of militia has promised a report.

The Six Nation Indians are protesting the registration of their members under the man and woman power act, claiming that they are wards of the crown and exempt from the act. Their appeal against the M. S. A. for the same reason was recently allowed.

ing for forty months," said the man. "First on the Russian front, where I had an easy time, and now here, where the Italians are making things too hot for us. There is no food for the people of Austria, and next to none for the army. I had but a few pieces of bread and potato before the fight and since the fight began I have had none."

Army Cannot Last. "The army cannot last more than a couple of months at the best. There are no good officers left. We have plenty of ammunition, but no one to use it properly."

It is said, also that at the beginning of the offensive the Austrians in the front line each received three rations of meat, one for each day of the attack until they reached the Italian stores. They were so hungry, however, that they ate all of them the first day.

An interesting remark was made by one of the prisoners. "We are not influenced by the idea of America's help," said this man. "We think that the American troops cannot ever get over, but the Allies do not need the Americans to whip us. The German food conditions likewise," he added, "appear to be as bad as ours."

SERIES OF IMPORTANT VICTORIES FOR ITALIANS.

ROME, June 20.—From the Montello to the sea the battle of the Piave River is continuing bitterly without pause, the Italian war office announced today. Last night the Italians forced the invaders to withdraw their whole front north of the Monte Belluno railway. More than 1200 Austrian prisoners were taken and numerous machine guns were captured here, 513 west of San Dona di Piave, 102 on Asiago plateau and 100 in the capture of Costa Lunga, total of 1341.

The Austrians yesterday afternoon, says the statement, launched a fresh

attack on the Piave with strong forces and succeeded at first in gaining some ground in front of Zenson. Later Italian reserves were brought up and forced the Austrians to retire.

French Storm Positions. Fresh forces on the Asiago plateau stormed the Austrian positions at Bertico and Pennar.

Italian troops succeeded in capturing Costa Lunga, the statement adds. The text of the statement reads: "From the Montello to the Zenson the battle is continuing bitterly without pause. Yesterday evening we drove the enemy back to the north of the Monte Belluno railway and made him withdraw his whole front of attack somewhat towards the north-eastern salient of the Montello, capturing 1,226 prisoners and taking numerous machine guns."

Grim Struggle on Piave. "Along the Piave River the struggle is fluctuating fiercely on the front lines. It is being carried out by the enemy with decision and hardness and sustained by our troops with great stubbornness and bravery."

The fighting sector to the west of Zenson, but was promptly checked and afterwards was forced to retire by our reserves which immediately arrived. "Our troops with energetic counter-attacks succeeded in greatly reducing the fighting sector to the west of San Dona di Piave. Prisoners to the number of 513 remained in our hands."

"Czech-Slovak units have valiantly taken their first tribute of blood to the general principles of freedom and independence for which they are fighting on our side. On the 20th and 21st of the 20th and 21st Regiments were able yesterday in repeated counter-attacks to bring out all their valor."

"On the Asiago Plateau, French units by a successful surprise operation carried the positions of Bertico and Pennar, capturing 102 prisoners. "Our troops completed the gains with the capture of Costa Lunga, taking another hundred prisoners."

"Enemy attacks on Corno were repulsed. "From dawn to sunset our own and allied armies and the sea-lanes of the Italian royal navy were all active in chasing and not allowing the enemy to approach our lines for observation or for other aims. Our machines carried out bombardments, attacked the enemy with machine gun fire and participated uninterruptedly and effectively in the battle."

"Fourteen enemy machines were brought down. One of our armies did not return alone the whole of our observation balloons co-operated usefully and courageously."

PS FROM AIRPLANE WHEN 9,000 FEET UP

Paris, June 21.—Sergei Kobayevski, the Japanese aviator in the French service, has been killed in an aerial battle. He was fighting against a number of enemies when his machine was set on fire by an incendiary bullet. He jumped from his airplane at the height of 9,000 feet and fell behind the French lines. Lieut. de Turenne has brought down his tenth enemy airplane, and has become an ace. Lieut. Madon has brought down his 34th.
