GERMANY WILL BE FORCED TO COMPLY WITH ALLIED TERMS

Teutons Have Displayed Arrogance Toward Entente.

Paris, Feb. 6.—(Havas Agency).—The supreme war council will meet at Versailles on Friday to take measures to impose on Germany "the full will of the Allies," says the Matin, because of the unwillingness of Germany to carry out the armistice terms except under certain conditions.
There has been a change in the attitude of Germany, according to the Matin, and it is being manifested by its willingness to accept the armistice terms.

OPTIMISTIC VIEWS AS TO THE FUTURE
Speakers at Trusts and Guarantee Meeting Predict Prosperity.
Officers of the Trusts and Guarantee Company addressing the shareholders at the annual meeting of the company held in Toronto, January 31 last, expressed the greatest satisfaction at the progress made by the company in the past year and were most optimistic regarding the future operation of the company.
President James J. Warren said in part:
"The year's operations were very satisfactory, the statement showing the greatest progress in any one year of the company's history. Not only was the volume of business very large, but gradually the size of the matters entrusted to the care of the company is assuming large proportions."
"Shareholders may expect further expansion in the operations of the company, as many millions of dollars of prospective business in the form of administration under will and other trust instruments have been accumulated from time to time."
"Unsettled conditions prevailed during the war with high operating costs. Since the signing of the armistice, matters are moving toward a more stable and profitable basis. The Canadian situation is a stabilizing factor, and the country's great natural resources will proceed to develop."
General Manager E. B. Stockdale gave a more detailed account of the company's operations during the difficult war period. He said in part:
"The statements which have been submitted to you today showing the result of the past year's operations will, I am sure, be regarded as most satisfactory. I wish to bring particularly to your attention the very substantial increase in assets and trust administration by the company. This is over three and one half millions of dollars, an addition to the previous total of over 40 per cent."
"The proper and careful administration of what you leave is quite as important to your family and dependents as the amount you leave."
"The guaranteed trust funds committed to the management of your company are operations during the war exceed five millions of dollars, the volume of which provides satisfactory earnings."
"The addresses of the company's officers were well received by the shareholders. The retiring board of directors was re-elected without change, and Messrs. J. Warren and E. B. Stockdale reappointed president and general manager respectively."

DENIES KNOWLEDGE OF ILLEGAL IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR INTO B. C.
Former Prohibition Commissioner Findlay Testifies at Vancouver Hearing.
Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 7.—Knowledge of illegal importation of liquor into Vancouver by the Western Canada Liquor Company was denied in preliminary hearings yesterday by former Prohibition Commissioner Findlay, who was placed in the witness box by the crown to testify against the liquor company. Regarding the crown's attempts to connect Findlay with the importation of liquor, when five carloads are alleged to have been sent to this city from Montreal in November, the witness swore under oath entered strenuous denials. The case was adjourned for one week.

COL. ROBT. H. LABATT, LATE OF PENSIONS COMMISSION, DEAD

Native of London—Son of Ephraim Labatt.
LONG MILITARY CAREER
Commanded 4th Battalion, C. E. F., in France Till Taken Ill in 1915.

HAMILTON, Feb. 6.—Col. Robert H. Labatt died this evening at his home on Fairmount road, this city. He was born in London, Ont., in 1853, being the only son of Ephraim Labatt.

Col. Labatt had a long and distinguished military career. He joined the Q. O. R. at Toronto in 1885 as a private, and later transferred to the 7th Regiment at London. He took part in the Northwest rebellion, and had a medal for that service. In 1888 he came to this city and took out a commission in the 13th Royal Regiment, rising to be its commanding officer, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, in 1914.

When war broke out he volunteered his services and was appointed to command the Hamilton men who were attached to the 4th Battalion, C. E. F., at Valcartier. Later he was appointed to the command of that unit and took it to England and France. He fell ill in France in June, 1915, and had to relinquish the command. He underwent an operation in England and when fit returned to Canada with the Mons star. Colonel Labatt was a member of the Dominion pension commission for some time, but resigned.

In business he was a broker. For a number of years he was Hamilton agent for John Labatt, London, brewer. A widow and two sons survive, Robert, at Ashbury College, Ottawa, and Henry, at home.
The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon and will be private.
