Last Barbarism in Toll Roads Form Has Disappeared

Professor Henderson Tells Surveyors of Government Taking Over.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—Within the last ten days the last barbarism in the form of toll roads in Ontario has disappeared, so Professor G. F. Henderson, provincial drainage referee, announced at the convention of the Ontario Land Surveyors' Association here today. The last of the toll roads to have been taken over by the Government, Professor Henderson said, was in the vicinity of Ottawa. It was announced that the following have been the final examinations of the Ontario Land Surveyors' Association: P. W. Beatty, Pembroke; L. G. Nanton, Toronto; A. Matheson, Kincardine; and W. G. Tre, Toronto. The members of the association were entertained at dinner tonight in the Engineers' Club.

CARPENTERS DEMAND EIGHTY CENTS AN HOUR

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—At a meeting of the Carpenters' Union last night it was decided to insist upon an eight-hour day and a wage of 80 cents an hour. These demands have been absolutely refused by the builders. J. W. Bruce of Toronto, Walter Price of New York, and N. Arcand of this city, all members of the union, addressed the meeting. The situation is so serious that J. T. Donlin, president of the building trades of the American Federation of Labor, has been called to take charge.

ACTION TO UNSEAT MEAFORD MAYOR OFF

MEAFORD, Ont., Feb. 18.—Alexander Londry has dropped his action to unseat Mayor Grey on technical grounds. Both men are members of the Methodist Church here, and settlement of the case has been brought about through friendly church members. The proceedings were set down for hearing before the senior county judge at Owen Sound next Monday.

Some Method Must Be Devised For Conservation of Forests — United States Dealers Outbid Home Buyers in Mad Scramble To Get Materials — Imperils Housing, Immigration, Settlement.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—That some method will have to be devised for the conservation of Canadian forests against the insatiable demand for lumber and newsprint from south of the boundary, is generally admitted here. At the present time the United States is consuming 85 per cent of the output of Canadian pulp mills, and wants the other 15 per cent, which by order is supposed to be reserved for Canadian consumption. One Canadian company in Quebec is at present being proceeded against because it has refused to supply Canadian consumers, and is alleged to be "hoarding" the 15 per cent supposed to be reserved for Canadian use. Probably a more serious feature of the situation, however, is the fact that, owing to the tremendous demand from the United States for Canadian lumber, it is almost impossible for Canada to secure any lumber at all. The situation is particularly acute in the case of newsprint, and a complaint has been made to the Board of Commerce.

Cost No Object. Cost appears to be no object to United States consumers. It is stated that the best prices for the price from Canadian lumber dealers and express a willingness to grant a premium of as much as 10 per cent on that. In addition to this the dealer is encouraged by the prospect of an exchange of about 15 per cent. Consequently Canadian consumers must pay if they wish to get the lumber, a premium of something like 40 per cent. In fact there are indications that United States consumers are willing to outbid Canadian consumers no matter what the price.

Denuding of Forests. The denuding of Canadian forests might be prevented by the placing of a limit upon the annual "cut" of lumber, and by an aggressive campaign of reforestation. Lumber is too easily obtained in the past, are nevertheless, viewable from time to time. To reduce the "cut" to a limit commensurate with reforestation possibilities, might save Canadian forests from ultimate destruction. But it would not mend the situation so far as Canadian and American demands are concerned. The United States would surely absorb the total reduced supply.

Legislation Anticipated. As a matter of fact legislation may be anticipated at the coming session, which will have as its purpose the conservation of resources, which are indigenous to the country, and which are in danger of utter denudation through the insatiable demand for them from countries which do not possess them. It may be pointed out that the danger of denuding of Canadian forests does not lie entirely to the south. Australia's forests are of a rosinous character, and their wood not fit for pulp manufacture, and Australia is not only looking to Canada for newsprint supplies, but actually demanding that contracts be filled.

EMBARGO IS POSSIBLE. OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—(Canadian Press).—Following reports of a threatened lumber shortage in the west owing to the shipment of the Canadian supply to the United States, the Board of Commerce is in receipt of similar communications from Toronto. These are to the effect that the lumber situation in that city is acute owing to the almost complete shipment out of the country of building materials, including lumber. The board is asked whether there was any intention on the part of the board to try and regulate the export of lumber from Canada, a high official was said nothing.

Should the need of action in the line of placing an embargo on export of lumber arise, it would seem to be a matter for the whole government to take up and decided whether such action should be taken.

DAIRYING INDUSTRY PROVES PROFITABLE TO DEREHAM FARMERS

INGERSOLL, Feb. 18.—Dereham farmers who are patrons of the Standard Cheese and Butter Manufacturing Company found the year 1919 exceptionally profitable. The financial report submitted at the annual meeting, which was held yesterday in the village hall, was marked by several outstanding features, indicative of the importance of the dairy industry in the township. The total receipts for the year were \$147,438.78, distributed in a small area among about 80 patrons. The total amount of milk received during the year was 5,711,325 pounds, while the cheese manufactured totalled 132 tons, 1,798 pounds. There was manufactured 9,320 pounds of butter, the value of which was \$4,565.85, and the value of the cheese made during the year was \$107,740.82. The average price per pound of cheese was 27.25 cents, and the average price per pound of butter 47.32 cents. A dividend of 10 per cent was received by the shareholders, and after paying an overdraft from 1918, amounting to \$721.57, there remained a balance on hand of \$281.18. James Mayberry was re-elected secretary for the 25th year.

OVER THEIR OBJECTIVE. ADELALDE, Feb. 18.—The parish of St. Ann's Church, Adelaide: St. Paul's Church, Kerwood, and Grace Church, Fourth Line, Warwick, has engaged in a very creditable campaign for the Forward Movement. They voluntarily assumed as their objective the sum of \$3,000, of which the part of Adelaide was \$1,000; Kerwood, \$1,250, and Fourth Line, \$750. The sum of nearly \$3,000 has already been attained, of which Adelaide (which, owing to the flu, has still a few names to canvass) raised \$880; Kerwood, \$1,585, and Fourth Line, Warwick, a little over \$750.

FOCH'S CAR IS SOLD FOR 74,000 FRANCS

PARIS, Tuesday, Feb. 17.—Marshal Foch's famous blue and black motor car, with the marshal's baton painted on the panels, which he used during the war, has been sold at auction for 74,007 francs.

EX-HEAD OF CHAIN OF GROCERY STORES CHARGED WITH THEFT

S. C. Williams Granted Bail While Auditors Examine Company's Books.

W. O. MAN FOUND DEAD

Additional Hydro Power Is Offered To Sarnia by the Hydro Commission.

SARNIA, Feb. 18.—Stanley C. Williams, one time head of the chain of grocery stores here, appeared in the local police court today before Police Magistrate Gorman. He entered no plea and was allowed out on bail for another week to permit the investigation of the books of the company by an auditor.

THEFT OF \$500 CHARGED. During today's court session only one charge against the accused was read. The charge alleged a theft of \$500 from Ivan Walker by wrongfully or unlawfully converting the same for his own use. After a private conference between the counsel, Crown Attorney Wilson in addressing the court stated that the suggestion had been advanced that the books of the corporation be audited and a statement be secured in order to clear up a somewhat complicated situation. J. M. McEoy of London spoke in support of the latter suggestion, expressing the opinion that it would be more satisfactory to all concerned, and this action was agreed to.

FOUND DEAD IN CHICAGO. News was received here today that Fred Atkins, a great war veteran, believed to be a former resident of Western Ontario, and thought to have enlisted in Toronto, had been found dead in a Chicago Salvation Army hotel last night as the result of a self-inflicted bullet wound. Atkins was apparently a member of the 20th Battalion, C. E. F.

ADDITIONAL POWER

Tonight the Sarnia Hydro Commission was notified by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario that arrangements have been made for an additional block of power, but at a considerable increase in price. This additional power, however, will not be available until all fear of ice trouble at Niagara Falls has passed. J. E. B. Phelps, local manager, is at present engaged in obtaining from power users in Sarnia estimates of the additional power required and when this is completed application will be made for the increased allotment.

TRAMPED 14 MILES ALONG SNOW-BLOCKED ROADS WITH \$2,000

Kitchener Bank Messenger Took Wrong Train For Breslau.

KITCHENER, Feb. 18.—A local bank messenger, new to Kitchener district, was sent to Breslau today with \$2,000 exchange money for delivery there. He got on the wrong train at the G. T. R. depot and landed in New Hamburg, seventeen miles from his destination. Alarmed at his predicament, he did not wait to wire the bank for instructions, but started to walk back

to Kitchener, a distance of fourteen miles. He arrived at his bank at 3 o'clock this afternoon in a rather fatigued condition. The roads were drifted and his tramp was not a smooth one, but he returned the \$2,000 intact to the bank.

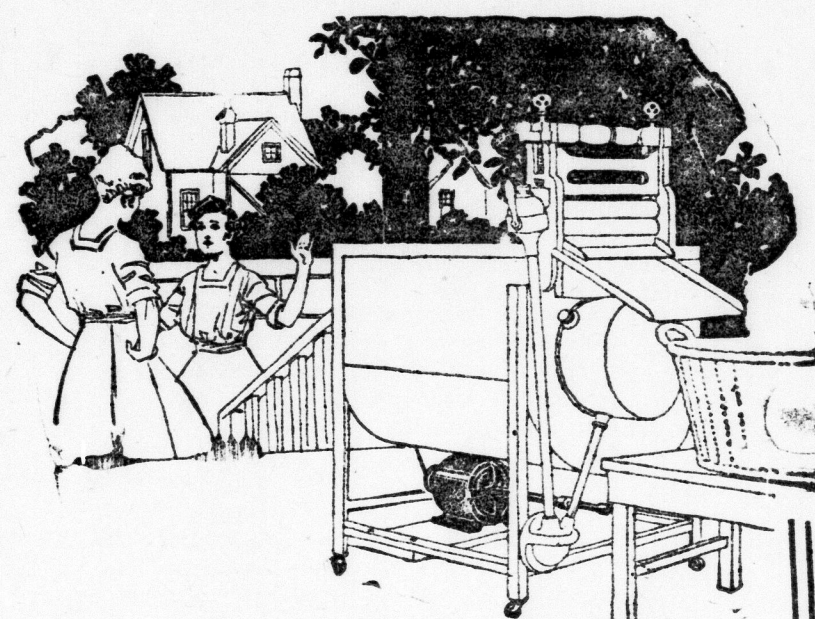
