CONCERT BY CHOIR EXCEEDED EVEN THE BEST ANTICIPATIONS

London Music Lovers Had Rare Treat At Dundas Centre Church.

The most liberal anticipations were surpassed in the uniform excellence of the program provided by Dundas Centre Methodist Church choir and assisting artists, under the direction of J. Parnell Morris, C.G.C.M., Thursday, Both Miss Louise A. Lyon, soprano, of Detroit, and Theodore Martin, tenor, of New York, were tendered remarkable ovations of applause, and by their highly talented and enduringly endeared themselves to London lovers of concert music, who attended in ever appreciative numbers.

An opening feature, an organ and piano number, by Ernest White, organist, and Misses Pearl Godwin and Mary Godwin, pianists, was Coleridge-Taylor's highly descriptive and stirring composition, "Editha," Saluting the "Colors." All three artists exhibited enviable impressionistic ability in the graphic facility of their interpretation.

The work of the choir was in every way creditable to all the members and gave evidence of careful training. The excellence of the choral work also in no small degree reflected favorably on the ability of Mr. Morris as conductor. Perhaps the choral number which was the most outstanding success was the rhapsody "Sedrift," another composition of the gifted Coleridge-Taylor. This number proved to be more the less popular or well received because it was of a somewhat different type from the other choral numbers. The closing number, "O Canada," was not the least appreciated, and it was pleasing to note that the audience arose en masse with out any individual hesitation at the very first strains of Canada's very own national song.

Part songs that were well presented by the choir and well received by the audience included "Come, Sweet Morning," and "Carmena," the latter sung with piano accompaniment by Miss Godwin. The choruses included "Chalkovsky's" "Russia's Prayer," one Tachmanoff number and two from Philip James.

Mr. Martin made an easy conquest of the favor of his hearers with his careful, mellow rendering of d'Hardelot's "When She Was Young" and Stokley's "Highland Joy." His honest, mellow, wonderful vibrancy, breadth, depth, power and exquisitely musical qualities blend in his remarkable voice. He sang two numbers from Geoffrey O'Hara's "After the Last One," "There Is No Death," insistent clamor of applause recalled him several times.

With pleasing variety, Miss Lyon selected her various numbers, and the simple little child-songs that she left till the last appeared even better than the first, sweetly rendered little morsels of musical nectar, among them, "Webs," "The Thirsty Child," and Philip Ferng's clever composition, "Prossie's Song." Perhaps Miss Lyon's best number was Quilter's "Now Sleeps the Little Princess." Another delightfully effective was Landon Ronald's "Sunbeams." Technical thoroughness and offering musical clarity of tone and sense of enunciation characterized her singing.

An aria from Mendelssohn, "Hear Ye, Israel," by Miss Lyon, and two numbers from Handel by Mr. Martin were other admirable features of the program.

At The Theaters

AT THE GRAND.
Tyronne Power, whose appearance in "The Servant in the House" drew a large, enthusiastic audience, has last night, has lost none of the subtle wizardry of interpretation which made the role of the unloving, beset, and traitorous one of the most wonderful on the modern stage, since his previous appearance here in the same role, a great actor as he was then, but during the intervening years much has transpired in world events and social attitudes that make some of the pointed sallies and clever situations in Charles Rann Kennedy's great play appear with less significance than when the play was written. But "The Servant in the House" is still a play that epitomizes the whole social fabric and existence of today.

After hearing so much of Bolshevism, in recent years the socialism which the dramatist, through Mr. Power's brilliant acting, announces as his religion seems a very old and mild philosophy. But it is the socialism which the dramatist first adhered to, that has triumphed in many cases, and not the socialism of today.

The company throughout is an excellent one. The role of the part of Man-son, the butler, but few could improve on the work of Harvey Hays. In the part of the play, there are passages calculated to recall Jesus of Nazareth, and the page boy's reference to reincarnation suggests the idea of the Christ reborn in suffering humanity. The allegorical significance and the esthetic teaching of the play well taken care of, in Mr. Hays' acting as well as the representation of the wonderful human personality of the Bishop of Bonar.

One could not imagine a more faithful portrait of the part of the vicar's wife than that provided by Miss Alva Chester, and the work of Miss "Chela Knight," as Mary, the vicar's niece, is that of a gifted and accomplished actress.

Especially capable support is given by the talented actresses who appear in the feminine roles.

Few flaws can be found in the work of J. Irving White as the bishop of Lancashire, and Walter Edwin plays the part of the vicar with an ease and naturalness that adds to its effectiveness. His work is refreshingly free from any apparent "studiedness."

The optimistic doctrine of modern Neo-platonism that wishes and thoughts do come true if held strongly enough is not obtrusively presented, but is quietly interlarded in the fairy tale of Mary and the butler. To bring out this philosophy their work is pleasingly effective.

The performance will be repeated this afternoon and evening.

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SCHOOL TENDERS TO BE CALLED SHORTLY

Every Effort Being Made To Get Work Under Way.

Tenders for building additions to the Worley road and Victoria public schools will be called for early in April. Now that the appropriation for school building has been approved by the city council and provision made in the tax rate to meet the interest and sinking fund on the debentures, every effort is being made to get the work under way.

Architect L. E. Carrothers is working on detailed plans and these will likely be submitted to a committee early next month, immediately following their approval tenders will be called for.

Additional room is most urgently needed at these two schools. The other projected plans will be carried out later. It is hoped that the new rooms at Victoria and Worley road will be ready for occupation when the fall term opens in September. Other additions may be completed by that time also. The proposed new collegiate will likely be the last building on the program to be completed and it is doubtful if it will be ready for use before September, 1921.

Seventy thousand dollars will be spent at Victoria school. Original estimates called for an expenditure of \$80,000, but these were reduced. This will provide for the addition of four classrooms and an assembly hall. A similar amount will also be spent at Worley road school, where six rooms will be added.

A new four-room school with a kindergarten will be built in the Ealing district at an estimated cost of \$80,000. The northeast section of the city will also have a new school costing \$35,000. Repairs and additional lavatories at Colborne street south school will cost \$6,000. Changes at Simcoe street school will cost about \$13,000, making a total expenditure on public
