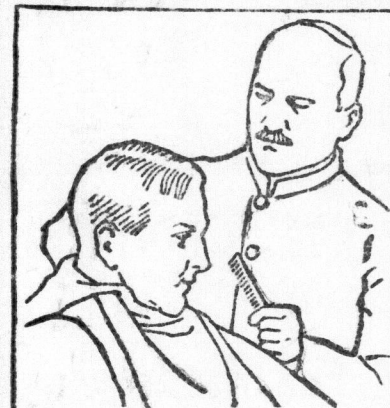

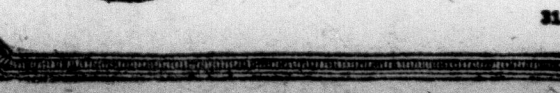

UNION GOVERNMENT ESCAPES DEFEAT AND ELECTION BY A BARE MAJORITY OF FIVE

Premier Borden's Refusal To Produce Correspondence Nearly Swamps Union Regime—Premier Stands For Secret Diplomacy About Washington Ambassadorship.—Narrow Majority Saves Government From Annihilation and Impossible Appeal To Country.

OTTAWA, May 17.—The House divided at midnight on Hon. W. S. Fielding's resolution calling on the Government to submit the matter to Parliament before proceeding with the appointment of a Canadian ambassador at Washington. The amendment was defeated by a majority of five. The vote was 63 for the amendment and 68 against.

Mr. Fielding received an ovation as he rose to record his vote. It was a straight party vote. The six members of the Progressives present voted with the Opposition. They were Messrs. MacNutt, Thompson, Qu'Appelle, Reid (MacKenzie), Knox, Kennedy (Glenagarry) and Johnston (Last Mountain).

The Opposition greeted the reading of the vote with such enthusiasm that the Speaker with difficulty brought the House through the formal process of going into committee. Mr. Fielding asked if the Government could not adjourn the House.

"We shall all want to reflect on the situation," he remarked. Sir George Foster moved the adjournment and the Opposition immediately gathered in groups celebrating the narrow Government majority with songs and cheering on the floor of the House as soon as the speaker had left the chair.

BORDEN WANTS SECRET DIPLOMACY

(Special To The Advertiser.)

OTTAWA, May 17.—After long negotiation Canada is to have a plenipotentiary at Washington. But with regard to the negotiations which led to that important departure, Canada is to know nothing. The new minister is to represent Canada at the United States capital. But no definition as to his status or functions or responsibilities is to be given to the Canadian people.

The negotiations, declared Sir Robert Borden tonight, in a sombre voice "were of a highly-secret nature," especially those with the United States. "They simply could not be made public. In fact, it would be highly detrimental to the public interest that they should be. He knew, for he had read all the correspondence, and he could vouch for its deadly secret character. But he was the only member of the House who would have the pleasure of reading it. The other representatives of the people could take his word for its nature.

That is about the conclusion to be derived from a full-dress debate, which took place tonight round a motion of Hon. W. S. Fielding to the effect that before any arrangement for the appointment of a representative was consummated the public should have full information regarding the negotiations between the Dominion, Great Britain and the United States, and that all correspondence and orders-in-council regarding the subject should be tabled.

The Canadian Parliament has, however, one prerogative in the matter. It will be called upon later on to vote the sum of \$40,000 for the upkeep of the new Washington establishment. "It is the prerogative of the crown," said Hon. N. W. Howells, "to deal in all matters of foreign relations. All the legislative sanction needed is the voting of the money."

To which Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, in the course of a striking and eloquent speech replied, "The president of the privy council tells us that he will give the House a chance when it comes to voting the money. That is the only way in which the House can get rid of the money."

Into Perfect Fury.

The president of the privy council whipped himself into a perfect fury of enthusiasm regarding the new "status" which Canada was to secure from having a representative at the capital of Canada's greatest and most important customer and neighbor, and there were cheers from men who in 1911 had voted against any truck or trade with that neighbor. Sir Robert Borden labored heavily in explaining that there was nothing to explain. Sir George Foster wove the flowers of rhetoric together, but really said nothing worth while. And out of all the talk from the treasury benches there emanated nothing.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux summed it up at the conclusion by declaring that they had spent much time talking upon the principle of having a representative at Washington, when as a matter of fact it was a question of procedure which was at stake.

"In connection with the demand for the correspondence and orders-in-council," said Sir Robert Borden, "as far as the correspondence is concerned, it does not tell the whole story, because many interviews were interpreted between. As far as it is concerned, I have personally examined it very carefully, and in my judgment it cannot be brought down with any advantage to the public, and probably with great detriment. The negotiations were of an extremely secret nature. To make them public the consent of all the countries would have to be secured, and they are not obliged to give that consent. Wherefore, because the negotiations were highly confidential, and in a greater degree so with the United States, the correspondence cannot be brought down. All that has so far been arranged has been placed before the House in a statement."

Little Appreciation. Indeed, the premier had little apparent appreciation of the demand for further information. "My honorable friends," he declared, "need have no apprehension in this matter. What does it amount to after all? I amount to this, and only this, that a country of eight and a half millions, bordering for four thousand miles with the United States, and more intimately associated with that country than with any part of the empire, believes that it should be represented directly at Washington. Is there anything startling or peculiar about that?"

Opposition members contended that this was not the point at all. "The point on which this House should take strong ground," said Mr. Fielding, "is that on matters of such vast importance this Parliament is entitled to fuller information than it has received so far. The tendency has been to magnify the power of the executive, and minimize the powers of Parliament. Cabinet is after all only a committee of Parliament."

"As far as I am concerned," declared Ernest Lapointe of East Quebec, "I will readily admit that anything that looks like national self-assertion appeals to me. I readily admit that any advance of Canada on the road to nationhood appeals to me. But what are the important steps are taken along that line? It is the duty of the Parliament of Canada, and not of the cabinet, to finally decide. Canada should know on what conditions Great Britain agreed to this. Canada should know the real status of the new representative, to what extent the British Government will be responsible for his appointment, and what say they will have in it, to what extent Canada will be responsible for his actions when in charge of the embassy, and other questions."

Supremacy of Parliament. "It is not a question of the wisdom or the unwisdom of having a representative at Washington," declared Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, emphatically. "What we want to bring concretely before this House is the question of the supremacy of Parliament or the autonomy of the cabinet. That is what is involved. A week ago we were promised that all available papers would be brought down. We expected at least some information. But the prime minister says we cannot get any more. He has gone through the files himself, but the representatives of the people cannot have access to these files. It is a mighty bad beginning of a new departure. If our foreign policy is to be bound up in secrecy, then we are traveling toward that vortex which led to the present European situation. What are we to expect from what follows?"

The president of the privy council has told us that he will give us a chance when it comes to voting the money. That is the only time the Government comes to Parliament when money is to be voted, and then it says to its followers: 'You vote the money or we will go to the people and you will lose your seats. Either you give us your support or we have an election, and out you go.'

There were two extreme views of Canadian representation at Washington, said Mr. King. One was that Canada should have nothing whatever to do with the British embassy; the other was that her representative should have full charge. There was, however, a middle view, namely, that Canada should manage her own affairs so far as possible, and Great Britain the same. He did not believe that the people desired that their representative should go to Washington and

deal with all questions of British diplomacy. The desire is not so much for information regarding the actual negotiations as for a fuller and freer statement as to what the Canadian Government accomplished through them.

PROVINCES TO HAVE CONTROL OF ROADS

OTTAWA, May 17.—(By Canadian Press.)—First reading was given in the Commons this afternoon to a bill which seeks to bring the control of electric roads under the jurisdiction of provincial governments rather than under the control of the railway commissioners. Last year a clause was put in the railway act placing the Quebec Central road under federal control, but it was found later that the clause took in all electric lines. This new bill, Hon. J. D. Reid explained, was to place electric lines back under the jurisdiction of provincial governments.

Replying to W. F. McLean, Toronto, Mr. Reid said no provision had been made to extend the jurisdiction of the railway commissioners with regard to telephone companies.

DRAYTON TABLES FURTHER ESTIMATES

OTTAWA, May 17.—Supplementary estimates to cover expenditures made during the last fiscal year were tabled in the House of Commons today by Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance. The total \$19,061,139, and include a vote of \$8,998,867 for soldiers' civil re-establishment (outside service), \$400,000 for reconstruction of the Port Colborne elevator, \$392,000 for restoration of the Parliament Buildings, \$4,550,000 for arts and agriculture and \$159,400 for charges of management. There is also a vote of \$600,000 for salaries and contingent expenses of the pensions board.

FLEET PUTS TO SEA.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The United States Atlantic fleet, which has been at anchor in the Hudson River for the past two weeks, put to sea today.

ATTACK UNIONISTS.

BELFAST, May 17.—While Unionist workers were leaving the Londonderry gas works this evening they were attacked by a mob and maltreated. The magistrates have advised all public

houses to close from 4 o'clock in the afternoon to 10 o'clock at night and have warned citizens to remain indoors at night.

DESIGNER INSPECTING SHIP.

CITY ISLAND, N. Y., May 18.—Charles E. Nicholson, designer of Shamrock IV, who arrived from England on the Mauretania, had his first thorough inspection here yesterday of the yacht

with which Sir Thomas Lipton hopes to win the Americas cup off Sandy Hook in July.

At the end of the inspection, which lasted several hours, Nicholson stated he was satisfied with the way his plans had been carried out. He suggested one or two minor alterations.

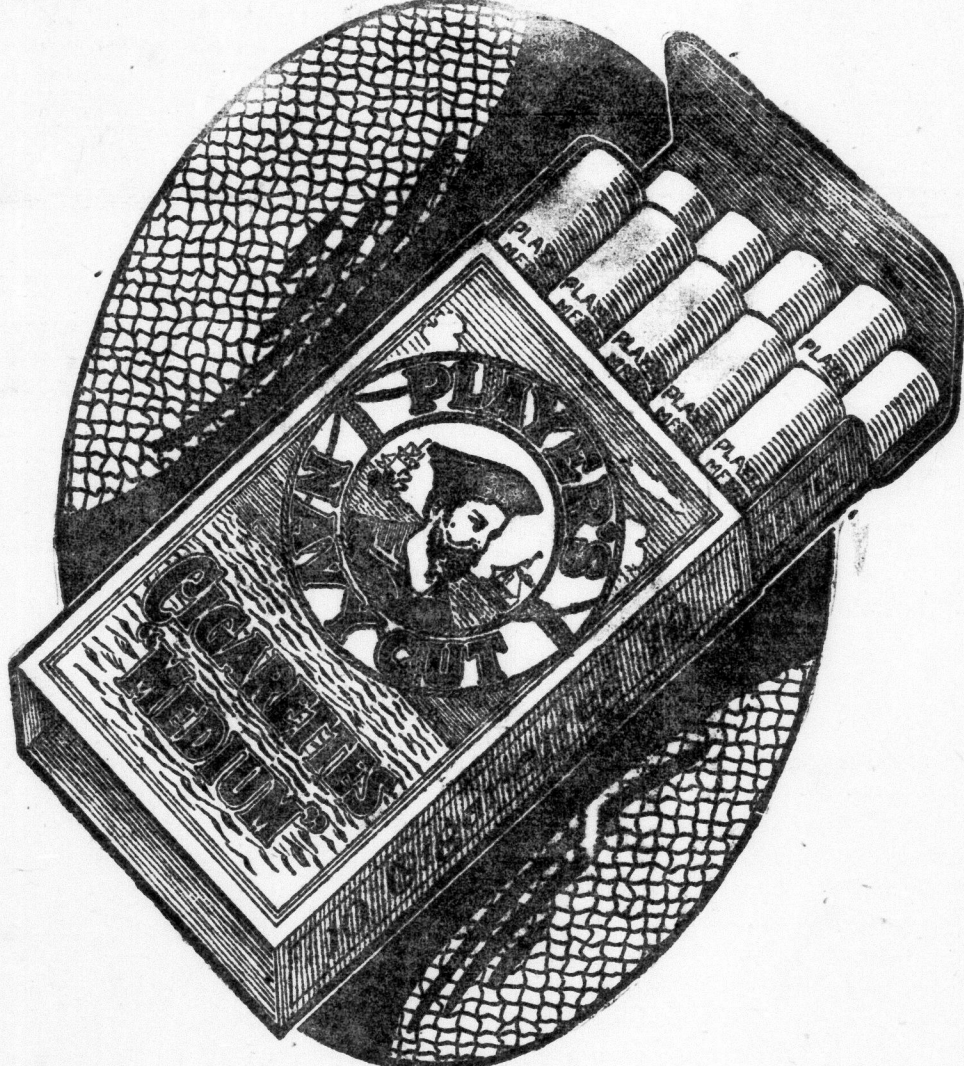
